

EDUCATOR DIES SUDDENLY

Succumbs While Awaiting Exam

WINSTON-SALEM — Educational circles are still shocked by the death of the veteran educator, Albert H. Anderson, who died, suddenly, at Kate Biting Hospital, Tuesday morning.

Mr. Anderson complained of not feeling well and told persons that he was going to the hospital for a checkup. He went to the hospital and died while he was being examined.

Funeral rites are slated for St. Paul Methodist Church, 4 p. m., Thursday with Rev. A. A. Wayfield in charge. He will be buried in Evergreen Cemetery.

He was born in Wilmington, Del., and received his early training in that city. He graduated from Lincoln University and received his master's degree from the University of Pennsylvania.

He came here in 1928 as French teacher at Columbian Heights High School. He was elected principal at Columbian Heights Primary School. Since that time he has headed the Columbian Heights Elementary School, Kimberly Park Elementary, Paisley Junior and Atkins. He was head of Atkins at the time of his death.

He headed the North Carolina Teachers Association, at one time, and is said to be, along with W. L. Green, responsible for Negroes being seated at the National Education Association. He was awarded the Silver Beaver Medal, by the Old Hickory Council, Boy Scouts of America. He was a member of the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity and was a charter member of the local chapter, Pi Lambda.

He married the former Gladys Harris, of Norfolk, Va., in 1928. To this union was born two children, Mrs. Jacqueline Ballester, a Winston-Salem housewife, and Albert, Jr., a student at Morehouse College, Atlanta, Ga. Surviving, besides his wife and children, are four brothers, Dr. Claud, Chicago, Ill.; Dr. Leon, Wilmington, Del.; Maurice, Phil-

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TWO DIE IN FIRE

ROCKINGHAM — Be Thou faithful until death is a warning to those who have accepted the tenets of the Christian religion. It could not be ascertained whether James Henegan was a student of this belief, but it has been definitely established that he was faithful until death.

He met his death early Monday morning, after he awoke and found that his neighbor's house, that of Postel Cameron was on fire. He leaped from his bed and ran swiftly to the burning house. He tried to enter the front door, but according to a description of the vain rescue by a woman, the door was locked.

Henegan is then said to have gone around to the back door and is believed to have gone in. Once inside the house, he was not able to get to Cameron. When the firemen had extinguished the flames and the search was made, Henegan's body was found just inside the back door. It was apparent that he was never able to get to the room where his neighbor slept. The firemen found Cameron's body in another room.

The cause of the first has not been ascertained. It is believed that Cameron lived alone in the house.

In Durham, while Rev. E. T. Browne, who has served as vice-chairman for two terms, was not a candidate for reelection, Mrs. V. M. Faulk was elected corresponding secretary and Rev. W. M. Fuller was made co-chairman of the finance committee. Alexander Barnes was the first member named to the executive committee.

Five precinct chairmen were certified by the convention: Rev. E. T. Browne, Whitted School; Alexander Barnes, Hillside School; S. F. Pompey Pearson School; William Keith, Burton School and R. W. Dalton, Pearsontown. Republican judges for the five precincts will be named soon and they will be Negroes.

Word reached Republican Headquarters recently that quite a few will be in attendance at the State Convention which meets in Durham, March 2nd and 3rd. This is believed due to the fact that William E. Cobb, chairman, State Republican Committee, sent out a call for all persons interested in the party to become available for grassroots work. There has been a ground swell for Republicanism, among Negroes during the past three months.

CHICAGO — An open, sincere and urgent invitation has been extended to Negro leaders, to come to here, Sunday, Feb. 25, to voice their opinions and solutions to the problems of the black man, in the United States.

"Everyone is invited," said Elijah Muhammad, Messenger of Allah, who added that "whoever has the best solution we will accept. All should unite and join behind it to solve the problem of the so-called Negro in the western hemisphere."

The meeting, first major gathering of the Muslims in 1962, is set for the huge International Amphitheater, at 41st and Halsted Streets at 2 p. m., on the above date.

"All darker people of the western hemisphere must come together," the spiritual teacher and leader of the Muslims, declared. "We must know each other, make better acquaintances and bring about, together, a better future for our people."

Business, professional, political and other leaders are urged to write or wire for time on the program at the Amphitheater at this meeting, Feb. 25, which will mark a distinct departure from the schedules of past Muslim gatherings. Outsiders will have the opportunity of speaking to the more than 15,000 Muslim followers of Mr. Mu-
