Winston-Salem Integration Committee Seeks Solution In Desegregation Dispute

WINSTON-SALEM — With a "goodwill" committee composed of four Negroes and three white persons already selected and confirmed, Mayor John R. Surratt of Winston-Salem Thursday indicated that he expects it to work toward a solution of the city's latest integration question.

The committee was named after the Winston-Salem NAACP leaders announced earlier in the week that they would take overt action to integrate Reynolds Park Skating Rink and that they might also integrate other facilities in the municipal park.

The skate-in party which was planned earlier was cancelled when the desegregation committee was appointed.

The Negro members of the committee are Curtis Todd, Alfred Scott, the Rev. Kenneth R. Williams, president of Winston-Salem Teachers College, and the Rev. Jerry Drayton. The white members are J. Paul Essex, Thomas R. Rice, and Dale Gramly, president of Salem College.

The goodwill committee will work in coordination with Dr. Clarence H. Patrick of the Wake Forest College Department of Sociology, consultant and advisor, and was scheduled to meet officially

Education: Preparation for Meeting the Challenges of Political Influence Upon International Brotherhood." (5) "Quality Education: A Tool for Developing International Relations," and (6) "Quality Education: Means of Improving Physical Fitness of International Brotherhood."

The Crown and Scepter Club is an honor society composed of outstanding students from accredited high schools of North Carolina. The club is to encourage the development of three qualities: Scholarship, Service and Character. It has grown from a membership of approximately 36 schools in 1933 to 115 schools today. There are over 650 members now belonging to this organization.
