Mr. Burton said that he had not read the decision thoroughly and in view of the fact that it was the opinion of the highest court of the land that the people of North Carolina were law abiding citizens and he had no reasons to believe that they would attempt to disobey the order of the body.

When asked why he had no comnent to make, he said: "Any comment I might make would be an impropriety and certainly I am gono trouble in North Carolina, over the seating of passengers, on buses and other modes of transportation and he did not feel that there was any reason for alarm over the most recent decision of the high court.

The court left no doubt in the minds of anyone as to where it stands on the entire matter of segregation on any vehicle, used for the public transportation of persons. It made it clear and distinct that persons riding on public conveyances should not and must not be forced to sit in certain places because of their color.
