

Editor's Note: Here are authorative answers by the Veteras Administration to questions from former servicemen and their families: Q-How long must a woman

have been married to a World War veteran before the VA will consider her a widow if he dies? A-She must have been mar-

ried to him for 5 years unless (a) a child was born to them. in which case there is no time factor needed or (b) unless she married him before Decembr 14. 1944. The similar date for World War II veterans is January 1, 1957, and for veterans of the Korean Conflict, it will be February 1. 1965.

Q-If a veteran names his mother as the beneficiary of his GI nsurance policy and then marries, is his wife protected?

A-The veteran will have to notify the Va if he wishes to name his wife as his beneficiary. Full details may be obtained at any VA office. Q-How many hospitals does the VA maintain outside continental

A-The VA has hospitals in each State in the Union, except Alaska and Hawaii, and in the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. In other U. S. possessions and foreign countries the VA contracts with existing hospitals to place veterans should the need arise.
