Mayor Tells Citizens Job Policy Up To City Manager

While members of the Raleigh City Council looked on in silence, Mayor William G. Enloe, at the Monday council meeting, proceeded to give the Raleigh Citizens Association a "dressing down" for its continuing efforts to break down the seemingly impenetrable wall of racial discrimination which surrounds City Hall.

The mayor's rebuke came after Ralph Campbell had read to the council a statement which showed, among other things, that a Negro woman, Mrs. Sarah S. Hall, had been led to believe, during a telephone conversation with Mr. R. A. Hoadly, that she was to report to City Hall for employment, only to be later called by Hoadly and told that a (white) woman had come in after his conversation with Mrs. Hall and had been given the job.

The Mayor then said, "that's the law. It's in the book. It will never come by pressure. It will come only through qualifications and the desire of the department heads to cooperate."

Theatre Tries Mixing Races In Raleigh

Negro students from North Carolina State College are now being admitted to the Varsity Theatre on Hillsboro Street. W. G. Enloe, manager of the chain to which the theatre belongs, revealed this week.

According to Enloe, the initial desegregation came without incident more than a week ago.

"I'm glad, though not surprised," said Enloe, "that the integration of the theatre was carried out without incident of any kind."

Guilford County's Job Policy Rapped By NAACP Officials

GREENSBORO — The hiring of qualified Negroes in county jobs was one of four requests made to the Guilford County Commissioners by the local branch of the NAACP here Monday.

Dr. George Simkins, Jr., president of the branch, also asked that the commissioners:

1. Integrate the county tax books.
2. Integrate rest room facilities in county buildings.
3. Revise the county map to name each Negro school rather than designate it "Negro School."

White Man Held For Killing

LILLINGTON — Fate took a new twist, as it relates to crimes committed against Negroes, by whites, when a Harnett County Grand Jury handed down an indictment against Waylon Godwin, 42 and white, for the killing of a Negro Tuesday after the jury heard the evidence.

Dr. Simkins suggested the hiring of some secretaries also and told the commissioners that the county is "wasting our qualified people" because they are going to Calif. and Washington where race is less of a barrier in getting good jobs.

William Ragdale, Jr., vice-chairman, said that the county has made progress in the past 10 years and that in the next five years there will be two to three times as much as in the past ten.

Commissioner Carson Bain said that next year, taxpayers would be getting abstracts through the mail, the way income tax forms are sent. "I see no reason why we can't do that," he said.

Mt. Olive School Buildings Burn

WHITEVILLE — Fire of undetermined origin, destroyed two frame buildings at the Mount Olive High School, nine miles north of here, Sunday night.

The white students bought tickets and gave them to their Negro colleagues and before the management knew it some of them were in the theatre. This plan worried the management so until he stopped selling tickets, at the booth, to white patrons and set up a booth, inside the building, or what they thought were non-participating whites.
