

# BOLD ROBBER IDENTIFIES HIMSELF TO VICTIM HERE

## Teenage Burglar Tells All

A 16-year-old Raleigh boy brought about his own undoing last Friday morning by identifying himself to a robbery victim. He is now languishing in Wake County Jail on a charge of first degree burglary.

Police Officer H. K. Wall was informed by Mrs. Emma Mae Dunn, 45, of 263 N. Pettigrew Street at 9:46 a.m. Friday, that James Robert Hopkins, alias "Charlie," 16, of 1124 1/2 E. Edenton Street entered her house while she was asleep.

"I was awakened Mrs. Dunn said, by movements in my bedroom." She stated she saw young Hopkins beside her bed with her pocketbook, from which he stole \$1.90.

Mrs. Dunn further stated she recognized him and declared he spoke to her saying, "Everything is alright. This is Charlie."

At this point, the complainant said, he ran out the back door, taking the money.

After she signed a warrant, charging burglary, Hopkins was arrested. At the time he entered the home, he was wearing brown pants and a tee shirt and was attired in the same dress when he faced Mrs. Dunn for positive identification for the police record.

A date had not been set for the trial as late as Tuesday night of this week. The jailer on duty at the county jail, stated the question mark appearing behind "date of trial," indicated to him that more evidence was being gathered or an attorney being secured. Detective Sgt. F. C. Gregory also is investigating the case.

## NC Mutual Veep Sparks NIA Meet

NEW YORK, N. Y. — The 45th Annual Convention of the National Insurance Association opened Wednesday with 400 delegates from 25 states in attendance at the Roosevelt Hotel. The Home Office Section keynote speaker, J. W. Goodloe, executive vice-president, North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company, Durham, North Carolina, urged the executives of the 45 predominantly Negro member companies to take a "good hard look at the myriad of changes in the making and meet the 'challenge of change' with a shift in management outlook, perspective and practices in keeping with President Johnson's "Great Society" concept.

"We are meeting less than three weeks after 1965's biggest date for the history books," Goodloe stated. "The date when Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act marked the end of one era in race relations and limited opportunities and the beginning of another of vastly increased chances for self-realization. Possibly no other group of life insurance companies in America is so profoundly affected by this legislation as our own."

# "WE WILL FIGHT VIOLENCE WITH VIOLENCE," JUSTICE DEACONS SAY

## 'Freedom Defenders' Speak Out

BOGALUSA, La. (UPI) — This strife-ridden town where race hate was at a fever pitch last week faced threats from an armed Negro vigilante group to "meet violence with violence" as white segregationists threatened reprisals by enforcing common-law marriage laws of the state.

In an effort to ease the racial tensions, Gov. John J. McKeithen met with civil rights leaders in the Bogalusa movement — A. Z. Young, president, Civic and Voters League and Robert Hicks, vice president — to appeal for a "30 day cooling off period."

Seen as a retaliatory measure by a segregationist group — the Citizens Council of Louisiana — was its announcement that the council was starting a drive against common-law marriages among Negroes.

Warrants for the arrest of "three prominent niggers" were sworn out last week, but no action had been taken, it was disclosed.

The trio was not identified, but it was believed that one was Charles Sims, local chapter president of the Deacons for Defense and Justice. Sims allegedly has a common-law wife.

The man, identified as Jack Keeley, was arrested in Hilton hotel, NAACP convention headquarters, as he allegedly sought to phone Wilkins' room for the second time. Police said Keeley admitted calling Wilkins' room the day before when the death threat made.

Unknown to the racists, CORE members and newspaper reporters had infiltrated the group. The meeting, which had the usual ludicrous group of florid-faced, beer-mugging bigots, spent a good deal of time specifically denouncing CORE and named the "abolition of CORE" as

## Says His Statements Hurt Image

ATLANTA (UPI) — Charging that Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., maliciously defamed him in the shooting death of a Negro teen-ager in New York last year, Police Lt. Thomas E. Gilligan, New York, has filed a \$1.5 million slander suit against Dr. King.

Gilligan shot and killed 15-year-old James Powell last summer after he said the youth attacked him. A grand jury and departmental investigation later cleared the police lieutenant of charges that he had fired hastily and without justification.

The suit, filed in U. S. District court here, asserts that Dr. King said publicly last July 27, "Murder has been committed. The shooting of Powell was murder."

## Ambushed Negro Dead In Alabama

ANNISTON, Ala. — A 38-year-old resident of nearby Mundeford, Alabama, Willie Brewster, who was shot in the neck on a lonely highway near here Thursday, died Sunday in a local hospital without ever regaining consciousness.

Brewster was shot through a rear window of his moving car as he was returning home from work. The shooting followed two rallies staged here by States Rights spokesmen and the beating of a Negro student.

The shooting of Brewster took place about five miles west of here as he and three companions headed homeward after working.

He was struck in the spine and would have been paralyzed from the waist down had he lived. An occupant of the car stated (See AMBUSHED NEGRO, P. 2)

## Wilmington Native Accepts Area Supervisor's Position In Raleigh

Robert W. LeMay, director of Basic and General Adult Education, is Newkirk's immediate supervisor.

A native of Wilmington, Newkirk graduated from the Williston Industrial High School there, and holds an A. B. degree from Shaw University here, with a major in English and social studies. He has done further study at Durham's North Carolina College in the above-mentioned subjects and commerce.

## Mrs. Shepard Resigns Job In Harnett; To Shaw University

Mrs. Kathryn Young Shepard, 424 S. Bloodworth Street, this city, has resigned her position as supervisor of elementary schools in Harnett County to accept a post as associate professor of Education at Shaw University here.

In addition to her duties at Shaw, the educator has been engaged to conduct adult education classes in the city and is slated to become an area supervisor for the Adult Education Program in October of this year.

Mrs. Shepard, a native of Wake Forest, holds an A.B. degree from Johnson S. Smith University, Charlotte; an M. A. degree from Teachers College, Columbia University, New York; has earned an elementary certificate from Shaw; and holds an elementary principal's certificate from Durham.

The North Carolina Department of Public Instruction, in 1958, granted Mrs. Shepard a graduate certificate in Special Education and certified her as a psychological examiner. Both certifications were made as a result of special graduate work done at the University of Illinois, Syracuse University, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and North Carolina.

## Hospital Suits Are Filed In Six Southern States

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund and the NAACP Thursday filed complaints charging 12 federally assisted hospitals in six Southern States with discriminatory practices.

A letter to Celebrezze, Jack Greenburg, Legal Defense Fund director-counsel, and J. Francis Pohlhaus, NAACP Washington Bureau, counsel, asked "that appropriation be taken to insure immediate compliance with the nondiscrimination provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964."

Under the law, federal funds could be withheld from facilities that practice discrimination. The NAACP and the Legal Defense Fund, an independent organization, represent individuals who have encountered discrimination in the hospitals.

## Mayor Daley Meets With Leaders Sat.

CHICAGO (UPI) — While the campaign against de facto and de jure segregation in the city schools continued unabated, two shifts were recorded on governmental levels.

On the heels of the postponement of the congressional subcommittee hearing into the school situation by Rep. Adam Clayton Powell (D-N. Y.) until July 31, Mayor Richard J. Daley dispatched a telegram to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., setting July 24 as a day which he would be available to meet with civil rights leaders.

Dr. King is scheduled to launch the Northern Christian Leadership Conference campaign against de facto school segregation in Chicago on July 24. In his telegram, the mayor stressed that "all of us are deeply concerned with the issue of human rights and opportunities."

He added, "In Chicago, we have many programs under way, and since you are visiting our city, I look forward to discussing these and other programs with you, and to receive the benefit of your learned thoughts and suggestions."

On his visit to the city last July 7, Dr. King said he would be willing to meet the mayor. However, he stipulated that he would do so "only . . . with the local civil rights leadership."

## Jas. Farmer Explains New Stand

NEW YORK, N. Y. — James Farmer, National Director of CORE, spoke out last week in defense of the Louisiana-based "Deacons for Defense and Justice" organization — a group of Negroes in the South who have armed themselves to defend their homes against racist violence. Speaking in his weekly column, which appears in a New York Negro weekly, Farmer said, in part: "Let's get two things straight regarding the Deacons for Defense and Justice down in Louisiana. Yes, they tote guns and no, they don't shoot first. A good deal of nonsense has been talked about the Deacons, most of it coming from the Southern press — in an effort to discredit CORE, the Deacons, and even to justify violent reprisals and assaults from the Klan."
