Over here we hear quite a bit about the protest against the U. S. in Viet Nam. So I am enclosing a poem I wrote which more or less expresses my feelings and I'm sure the feelings of every fighting American here in Viet Nam. Perhaps if the people read it, they will better understand how it is for us down here.

MELVIN S. HALL JR.
A PLEA TO YOU
As I sit here in this dismal tent,
My arms are folded, my head is bent,
I keep asking myself, "why must this be?"
Far from my home, away across the sea.

This place I'm at, they call it Chu Lai
Many young men come here, and here some of them die,
But die for what, is it all in vain?
And at this point, my heart is filled with pain,
The pain of disgust of some people back home,
Who protest on the grounds I used to roam.

What do they object to, what do they mean?
Burning of draft cards can even be seen.

They want us to leave here, pull out of Viet Nam
And let it be taken by the Communist Viet Cong.
They do not consider the men who have perished,
Leaving their loved ones and life so dearly cherished,
We are Americans, people of dignity,
Fighting to preserve human rights and liberty.

Fighting now in Viet Nam, certainly much to our sorrow,
But complete victory here today can make all the difference tomorrow.
We must fight hard, steady, and fight even more
So communism will never find it's way through our own front door.

To you few Americans who protest and disagree,
Just consider what you have and I'm sure you will see
It's worth fighting for, and if need be, dying for.

Don't tear down our morale, our desire, our dedications,
But give us your moral support, your prayers, your inspirations.
So when I go back across this vast blue sea,
And return to my home, the "Land of the Free" I can walk with my head held high.

Court of Appeals was asked last week to decide whether three Negro nurses fired two years ago for eating in the "white" cafeteria of Dixie Hospital, Hampton, Va., are protected by the Constitution against racial discrimination practiced by hospitals receiving federal monies, under the Hill-Burton Act. The nurses were among the hospital's Negro employees forced to eat in a converted classroom, while white employees used a new cafeteria.

GOP BILL
WASHINGTON (UPI) - In an effort to steal the Democrats' thunder, 18 House Republicans have proposed a new civil rights bill which would bolster enforcement of the civil rights laws now on the books. The GOP bill would strengthen federal criminal penalties for anyone depriving someone of his civil rights and make it easier to prosecute public officials involved in violence against civil rights supporters. It would also give the Justice Department the authority to initiate civil rights law suits on its own.

POOL SEGREGATION
BALTIMORE (UPI) - Charges of discrimination have been filed in U. S. District Court by six Negroes against the Cambridge Volunteer Fire Department. They contend that the department has used subterfuges to prevent Negroes from using its swimming pool and recreation arena. The litigants seek a federal injunction to compel the desegregation of the facilities.

ACUTE GRIEVANCE
MINNEAPOLIS, L. I. (UPI) - An investigation of charges that Negroes are being refused admittance into local volunteer fire department has been launched by Nassau county. "It appears that (the charges are) becoming an acute grievance with the Negro community," said Rawson L. Wood, chairman, County Human Rights commission. The county has 10,000 volunteer firemen in 71 companies. Only one of them is a Negro.

SELECTIVE BUYING
WASHINGTON (UPI) - A selective buying campaign supporting businessmen who back home rule for the nation's capital has been approved by the Interreligious Committee on Race Relations. The committee would not, however, support a boycott against opponents of home rule.

HOSPITAL BIAS
LYNCHBURG, Va. (UPI) - Participation of a formerly all-white local hospital in the Medicare program has induced it to accept Negro patients. Memorial hospital officials have signed a compliance form asserting that it will not discriminate. Virginia Baptist hospital is said to be considering such a move.

MOVING ALONG
EVANSTON, Ill. - Substantial progress toward a racially inclusive church in the Methodist North Central jurisdiction was reported recently by the North Central Regional council. In a review of the 19 months since the dissolution of the former Lexington conference of the racially-constituted Central jurisdiction, the report noted, "the merger has been effected without a colling of the ecclesiastical waters. (but) though it is formally achieved, it
