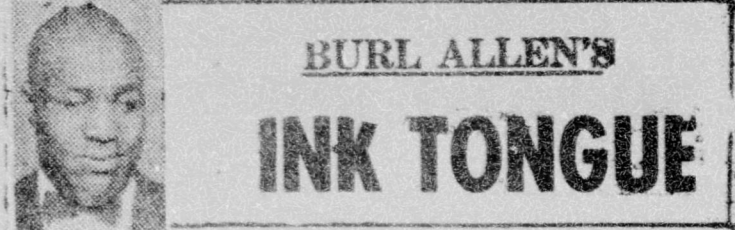

### Rev. Manning Installed At First Baptist, Smithfield

SMITHFIELD - A United Nations representative from Africa, who grew up under the influence of Baptist mission work, declared in a Smithfield address recently that all international conflicts could be resolved through practice of "the simple religion of Jesus."

David M. Thomas, counsel general and UN representative from Liberia, was the principal speaker at the formal installation of the Rev. C. L. Manning as pastor of Smithfield's First Baptist Church, Mr. Manning and his wife served as missionaries in Liberia in 1962 and 1963.

Mr. Thomas said that Pastor Manning and his wife "incarnated themselves into the hearts of the Liberian people" during their stay in Africa.

The UN representative preached a sermon on "The Simple Religion," giving emphasis to the two-fold command of Jesus to love God and "thy neighbor as thyself."

In preliminary remarks, Mr. Thomas said that Africa today "is in turmoil," struggling to find a better way of life, not always knowing which way to go. "I want to appeal to you to view the struggles of Africa with a sympathetic eye," he said.

One of the principles taught by Jesus, the speaker declared, is that "every man has a cross to bear, not a piece of wood, vertical and horizontal." This teaching, he said, "means that each person has responsibility to his family and to society." Bearing a cross means living by the teachings of Jesus, he said.

Among guests recognized at the service were parents of Pastor Manning and his wife and other relatives. White friends of the church were in the congregation.

At the close of the service, an offering was taken for the benefit of mission work in Liberia. It was announced that Mr. Thomas came to Smithfield at his own expense.

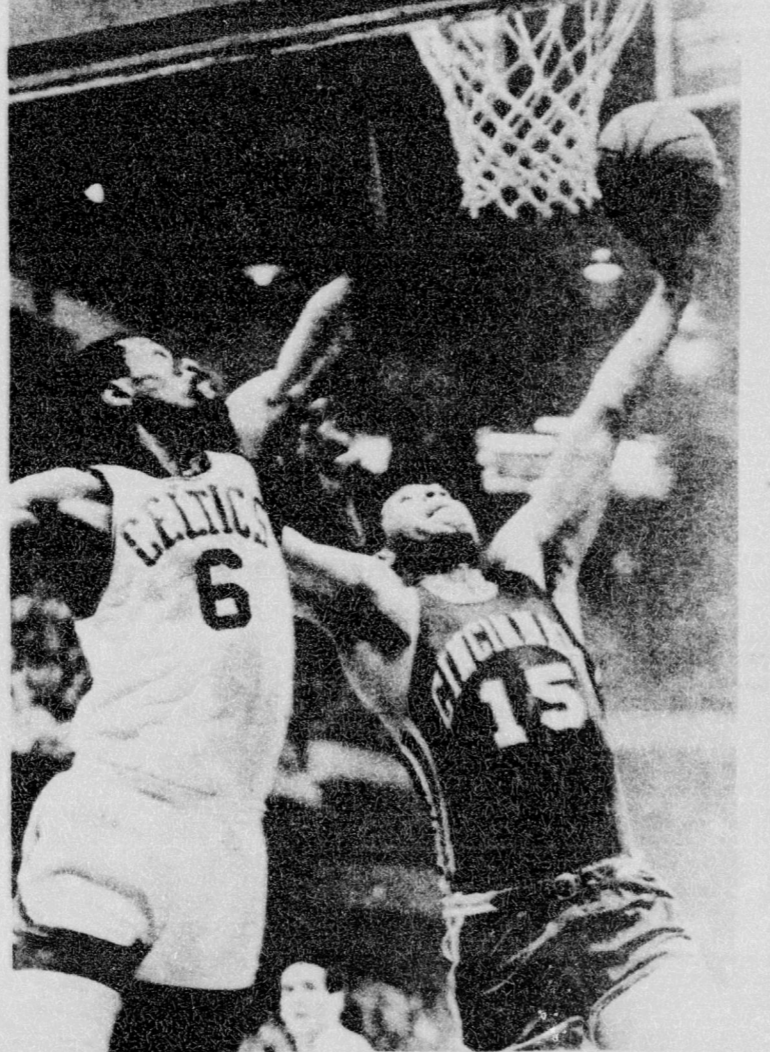

### Hate Forcible White Cleric To Give Up Negro Child

FULLERTON, Calif. (UPI) - Watts, in reverse is the way a white minister described racist intolerance which is forcing him and his wife to put up for re-adoption a two-year old Negro boy they adopted a year ago.

The Rev. Albert Cohen, 38, and his wife, Ann, 33, will return the boy, David, to the Los Angeles county adoption agency, a short time before they were scheduled to sign final adoption papers.

The minister, a graduate of the U. S. Naval Academy and Protestant chaplain, at California State College, said they have to give up the child because they have been "harassed, humiliated and threatened" by persistent telephone calls.

Rev. Cohen, who had been given police protection after someone painted "Watts" on the front door of his home, said he was afraid to take David to the store with him because "I can feel and see the resentment."

The couple, who have four children of their own, reported that they received a call from a man who told them, "get rid of the nigger or you might find one of your children gone."

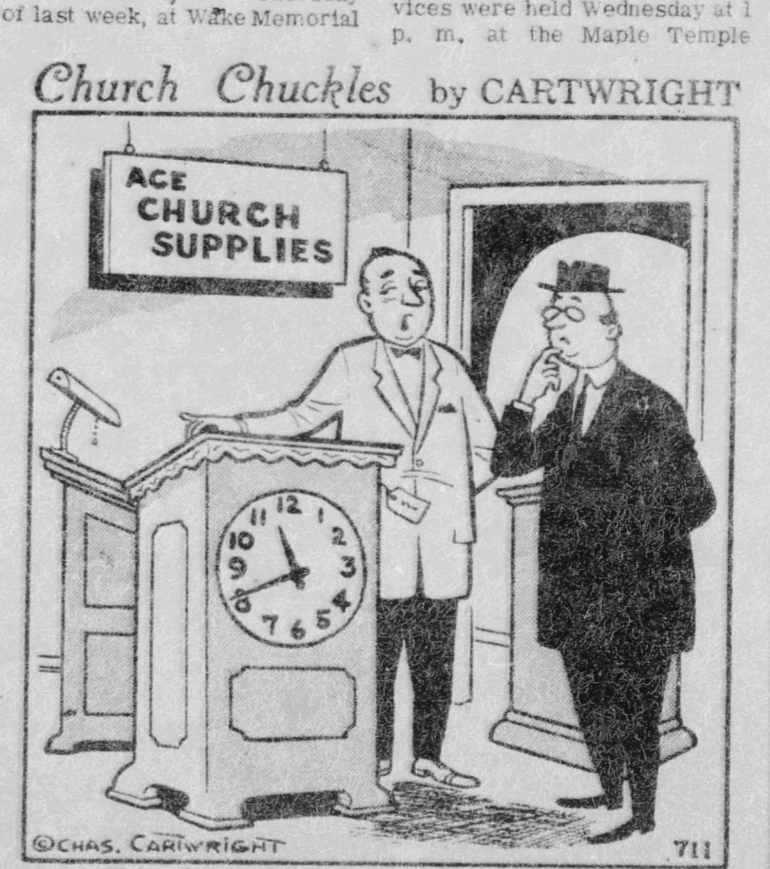
Mrs. Cohen said: "It was all right at first. We thought it would work out even though all our friends, black and white, told us it wouldn't."

"Giving up David at one time would have been the worst thing that could happen. Now what's happening is worse," the minister commented.

"We thought we could stand up and be counted, but we just don't have the personal strength. We found out what Fullerton's like. 'It's Watts in reverse.'"
