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NCC Will **Expand** Its Offerings

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DURHAM -- Approximately 150 courses covering a wide range of graduate and undergraduate subject-matter fields, special courses in education, and several special workshops and institutes will comprise North Carolina College's summer offerings this year, Dr. C. L. Patterson, acting director of the Summer School, announced this week.

The summer program, which begins June 6, will offer a six-week session, which ends July 14, and a nine-week session, which lasts until August

A faculty of 82 persons will consist of regular NCC personnel, augmented by 17 visiting specialists from other institutions and school systems. Not included in this total are persons, to be announced later, who will staff three NDEA institutes, Patterson said.

Among special offerings are a leadership in reading institute, an institute for newer media of instruction, a speech education workshop, and an institute for cooperating teachers -- all sponsored by the Southern Education Foundation.

In addition, the college will sponsor a six-week workshop for teachers of reading and will offer special courses for elementary teachers of the "new" mathematics.

Employment **Opportunities** Are Talked

GREENSBORO -- Pointing to the multitude of graduate scholarships and fellowships available and to the wide range of employment opportunities now beckoning Dr. Chauncey G. Winston, acting president, challenged students, particularly seniors, to make better use of their time in the days that remain before commencement, in his Senior Day address on Friday.

"Use your time fruitfully," he said, "study harder and complete your plans for next year -- whether it be a job or graduate school. I hope that some of you will pursue the doctorate. It would be fine in future years if one of you could qualify to become president of Bennett."

The seniors received their caps and gowns from their sophomore sisters and heard that their present leader in



scholarship is Miss Amanda Houston, a mathematics major of Kinston, who has a 2.83 academic average out of a possible 3.0 points. Running a close second is Miss Eva Rice, an English major, of Washington, D. C.

Following this program, the seniors planted and dedicated a magnolia tree in honor of former president, Dr. Willa B. Player and later were guests of the sophomores at a banquet.

THE VETERANS CORNER

Q -- How much time remains to obtain the re-opened GI insurance, so-called?

A -- Eligible veterans (those with service-connected disabilities even though they receive no compensation payments and those with nonservice-connected disabilities who are too disabled to obtain commercial insurance) have until midnight, Monday, May 2, 1966 to obtain the re-opened insurance. By that time, however, they must have sent not only their application but also sufficient funds to cover the initial premium payment. * * *

Q -- Congress has just passed a new GI Bill. When does It go into effect?

A -- It became effective immediately upon signing by the President, in all provisions except those applying to educational benefits. These will become available on June 1, 1966. * * *

Q -- I hear my child, age 21, is now entitled to educational assistance even though my peacetime service terminated before 1940. My serviceconnected condition is rated as permanently, totally disabling. What would his monthly allowance be if he enters college?

A ---Yes your child became eligible under a recent change in the law extending War Orphans' Educational Assistance to children, generally between ages 18 and 23, of both war time and peacetime veterans from the beginning of the Spanish-American Warperiod provided their permanent and total disability or death is serviceconnected. Allowances for institutional type training are: \$130 monthly for full-time study; \$95 monthly for threequarter-time study; and \$60 monthly for half-time study. ***
