\$108,382 Grant Given Winston-Salem State school year they will receive

ton-Salem State College was awarded a grant of \$108,382 by the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) to operate an Upward Bound Program for a 12-month period beginning March 30, 1966.

Dr. W. Archie Blount, vicepresident of the college and director of the program, made the announcement of the grant last week.

The grant is one of the first of 55 made by the OEO to fund programs for disadvantaged youth. It's purpose is to develop the potential of disadvantaged youth and motivate them to attend college. Two hundred such grants are anticipated under Title II-A of the Economic Opportunity Act of

"The Program at Winston-Salem State College," Dr. Blount said, "will involve one hundred 10th and 11th grade boys from Winston-Salem and Forsyth County. They will spend eight weeks on the campus beginning June 20 where they will receive academic work, counseling and cultural and recreational activities. During the 1966-67

The staff for the program will number around 20 and they will come from the college and the local secondary schools. No person qualified for the program will be denied par-

ticipation because of race. Rex Jarrell, assistant director along with public school officials and a sub-committee of the advisory committee are now recruiting students for the program. Students who participate will receive a \$10.00 a week stipend during the summer and \$4.00 a week during the 1966-67 school year.




