


Mr. Scruggs bemoaned the school drop-out youngsters. He stated that "Too often, Negro young people have been counseled not to have high hopes, fare. not to dream. In too many instances they have been inbued with the futility of trying. This has to change, and the place to begin it is in the public schools."

Urging the 160 graduates to pay the price for greatness, Mr. Scruggs warned: You must

be a good American citizen and you must stand for those principles and programs and policies which are for the betterment and strengthening of your neighborhood, your city, your state and your nation. There will be times too when you must put the general welfare before the narrower group wel-

Mr. Scruggs concluded: "In your grappling with the problems of the impatient, expectant world you inherit I sincerely believe you will do well because yours is a heritage of struggle, of faith, and of perserverence to achieve individual liberty, equality, and jusological Seminary.
