# St. Aug. **Gets Grant**

Of \$6,600 000 has been awarded Saint Augustine's College, Raleigh, by the National Science Foundation to purchase instructional scientific equipment in the Biology Department, it was announced last week by Dr. Prezell R. Robinson, acting president. The grant of \$6,600 will be matched by an equal sum from institutional funds. Dr. Joseph Jones, Head of the Biology Department, will direct the grant.

The equipment purchased from these funds will enable the Biology Department of St. Augustine's College to establish a course in Molecular Biology and to improve the laboratory training of students in the biochemical and physiological aspects of biology.

As a result of this grant, students taking Molecular Biology and related courses will have available additional modern equipment for making more accurate quantitative and qualitative measurements.

The new equipment purchased under this grant will be housed in the new addition to the science building the construction of which will begin in July. This addition will include laboratories for the study of physiology, bacteriology, nuclear science, physical chemistry and physics, as well as, a conference room and science library, animal room and green-

Included in the items to be purchased is a microscope equipped to take photographs of microscopic organisms. Also, ten student microscopes, incubators, ovens, analytical balance, centrifuge colorimeter and recorder, refrigerator and an apparatus for measuring respiration rates of microscopic organisms. In addition selected journals in biochemistry, physiology, and bateriology will
