## Problems Of Small Churches Should "Become Possibilities", Clerics Told

GREENSBORO--Ministers of small, rural churches were last week urged to convert their "problems to possibilities."

The speaker was Dr. M. Wilson Nesbitt, associate professor of the Work of the Rural Church, Duke University Div-

inity School. He delivered the keynote address at the 13th annual Ministers Institute held at A&T College, June 14-16.

Taking as his subject, "The Problems of the Churches in Small Communities," he told the group that while churches with large memberships give greater impact in the Christian world, those with smaller flocks still should play significant roles in the development and growth of the Christian faith.

He said the small church must have good "props" to accomplish its aims. These props were listed as: Strong and close fellowship and family relationships; good Christian organization principles and an alert minister who has good communication with his laymen leaders, a knowledge of what is happening in his community and ability to develop a program of faith and fellowship, not for Sundays alone, but all through the week.

## Bishop Walls Presides At Zion Meet

UTICA, NEW YORK - The annual session of the Western New York Conference, presided over by Bishop W. J. Walls, which was held at Hope Chapel, AME Zion Church, June 14-19, closed on a striking note of admonition on the United States' participation in the Vietnam War.

The committee on the State of the Country presented a resolution which attacked those who would advocate the destruction of mankind by means of war. It also pointed out that persons in high places should not dub those who speak out against war as disloyal. It further set out that the Church should take a stand against war as a destructive evil and not in line with the tenets of the Christian religion.

Bishop Walls dealt at length on the evils of war and said it was time for church leaders to take a stand against the evils designed to set men and nations against each other. The prelate also took a close look at the civil rights program. He again emphasized the fact that the recent white House Civil Rights Conference did not set any guidelines for the full implementation of freedom for all. He was also conscious of the fact that militant civil rights organizations needed to create a closer bond so that critics could not read an image of personal aspirational into the movement.

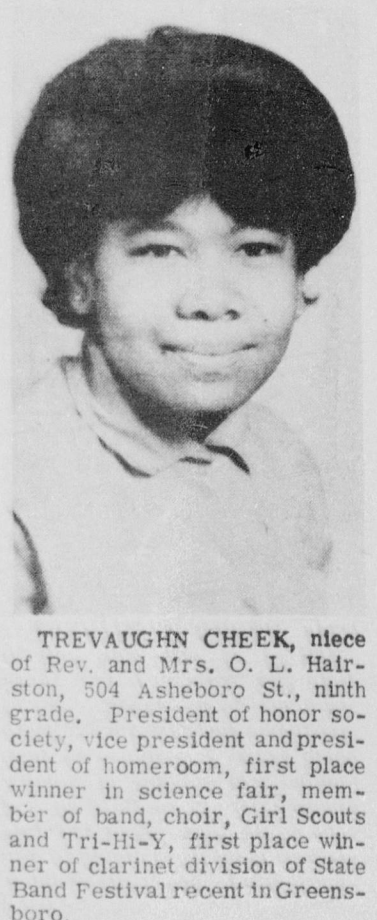

## \$85,000 Awarded To Virginia State College

PETERSBURG, Va. -- The Ford Foundation of New York has awarded a grant of \$85,000 to Virginia State College, Petersburg, for a program of music enrichment in the predominantly Negro schools in the Petersburg area.

The funds will be expended over a four-year period beginning September, 1966, and will be administered by the Department of Music.

The project is geared towards improving the musical interests and experiences of culturally deprived students in the predominantly Negro elementary and secondary schools in the Petersburg area, and will involve the college's music faculty and students.

According to Dr. F. Nathaniel Gatlin, head of the Virginia State College Department of Music, the program is expected to give the students an awareness of music as an added source for human happiness

and improving daily living, and to produce a desirable balance between the humanities, science, technology and math in the education of public school students.

In addition, the students will be exposed to a large body of knowledge represented by the field of music and learn of its relationship to other fields. The program is also expected to produce in the students an awareness of worthy vocational opportunities for those persons who have special talents in the field.

BIAS CHECK
