UTICA, NEW YORK - The annual session of the Western New York Conference, presided over by Bishop W. J. Walls, which was held at Hope Chapel, AME Zion Church, June 14-19, closed on a striking . note of admonition on the United States' participation in the Vietnam

The committee on the State of the Country presented a reso-Intion which attacked those who would advocate the destruction of mankind by means of war. It also pointed out that persons in high places should not dub those who speak out against war as disloyal. It further set out that the Church should take a stand against war as a destructive evil and not in line with the tenets of the Christian religion.

Bishop Walls dealt at length on the evils of war and said it was time for church leaders to take a stand against the evils designed to set men and nations against each other. The prelate also took a close look at the civil rights program. He again emphasized the fact that the recent white House Civil Rights Conference did not set any guidelines for the full implementation of freedom for all. # \$85,000 Awarded To Virginia State College

PETERSBURG, Va. -- The Ford Foundation of New York has awarded a grant of \$85,-000.00 to Virginia State College, Petersburg, for a program of music enrichment in the predominately Negro schools in the Petersburg area.

The funds will be expended over a four-year period beginning September, 1966, and will be administered by the Department of Music.

The project is geared towards improving the musical interests and experiences of culturally deprived students in the predominately Negro elementary and secondary schools in the Petersburg area, and will involve the college's music faculty and students.

According to Dr. F. Nathaniel Gatlin, head of the Virginia State College Department of Music, the program is expected to give the students an awareness of music as an added source for human happiness erly all-white schools.
