

## Self-Study Planned At A&T

GREENSBORO - A&T College will conduct a college-wide self-analysis during the coming academic year.

Plans for the project were outlined by Dr. Glenn F. Rankin, dean of instruction, on Tuesday at a meeting of A&T deans, department heads and administrative officers. The

meeting marked the beginning of a series of sessions, a part of the Pre-Session Faculty-Staff Institute.

Dr. Rankin said changes which have taken place at the college and in the region and increasing demands on higher education make periodic and critical examination impor-

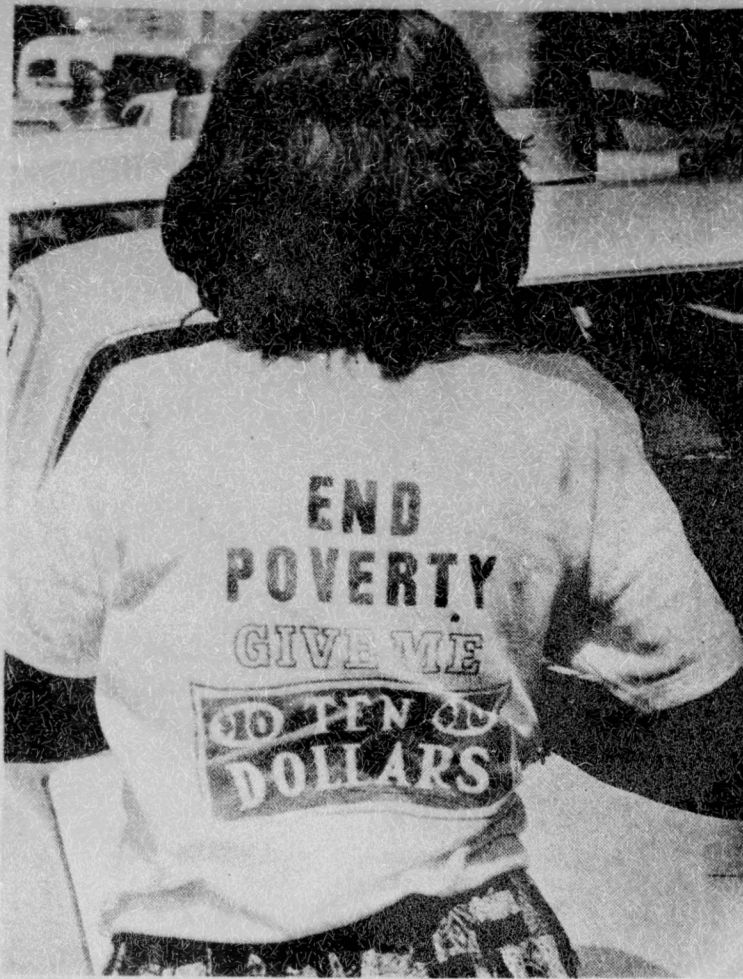
tant.

Among other reasons listed which make the self study necessary were: A growing enrollment, increased demands on the college by many publics, the election of two presidents within the past six years, the established need for a comprehensive review of the philosophy, objectives and long-range needs of the college, changes in regional and national conditions affecting higher education and the current demand in the State for reassessment of the aims and programs of all State supported colleges and branches of the State university.

Dr. Lewis C. Dowdy, president of the college, said that the project had been approved both by the A&T Trustee Board and by the faculty and that a full time executive secretary is to be appointed to coordinate the study. He announced that committees are to be appointed shortly.

## Red Cross Offering Opportunity

Your Red Cross is offering individuals and families in Wake County the opportunity to show in a tangible way that they are solidly behind our fighting men in Vietnam, according to David R. Cockman, Chairman of the Wake County Chapter.

"We want to make this Christmas a memorable one for our servicemen in Vietnam. To make certain that there won't be any "forgotten" U. S. servicemen in Vietnam on Christmas Day, the Red Cross proposes to distribute "ditty" bags filled with small gifts for every man or woman on duty there," Mr. Cockman said.

He explained that a ditty bag is a small, easily-made bag, given to the serviceman to hold his personal gear, such as shaving equipment, usually some letters from home, etc.

In order to assure success, the American National Red Cross is asking the local Red Cross chapters throughout the United States to secure and fill 360,000 of these ditty bags, 72,000 of them from the ten states in Southeastern Area, 900 from Wake County.

Individuals and organizations interested in participating with thousands of others in making certain there won't be a "lonesome Joe" in the U. S. Forces in Vietnam on Christmas morning should call the Wake County Chapter, American Red Cross, immediately for details.

## Bennett Staff To Include 9 New Members

GREENSBORO -- Announcement of nine additional faculty members at Bennett College was made this week by Dean Chauncey G. Winston.

The Rev. Peter Addo, a native of Ghana, has been named director of religious activities and instructor in religion. He is a graduate of Allen University, with the M. S. from Atlanta University and a master of religious education from the Interdenominational Theological Center, Atlanta.

Mrs. Lucy M. Brashear, a native of Bellevue, Ohio, who is a doctoral candidate at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, will teach English. She holds the A. B. and M. A. degrees from the University of Florida at Gainesville. Part-time instructor in English will be John W. Daniel, a native of Richmond, Va., and a graduate of North Carolina State University at Raleigh.

Teaching biology will be Lloyd M. Harris, of Decatur, Ala., a graduate of Tuskegee Institute with the M. S. from the University of Illinois. Mathematics will be taught by Eddie C. Paramore, of Baton Rouge, La., who is a graduate of Morehouse College with the M. S. from Atlanta University. Also from Atlanta University will be Arun Lal, a native of India, who is a candidate for the M. B. A., to teach business education.

Completing the group will be two India Exchange teachers--Mr. Kazimi, in philosophy and Mrs. M. R. lakshamma, mathematics, both from Maharan's College at Bangalore.

### PROTESTS VOWED

MILWAUKEE - Demonstrations against public officials belonging to segregated private clubs will be expanded all over the Midwest, NAACP officials have announced. In West Virginia, Kentucky, Wisconsin, and Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, and Illinois. According to William H. Hardy, Midwest NAACP field secretary, the campaign will be particularly directed at the Fraternal Order of Eagles, which does not allow Negro members.

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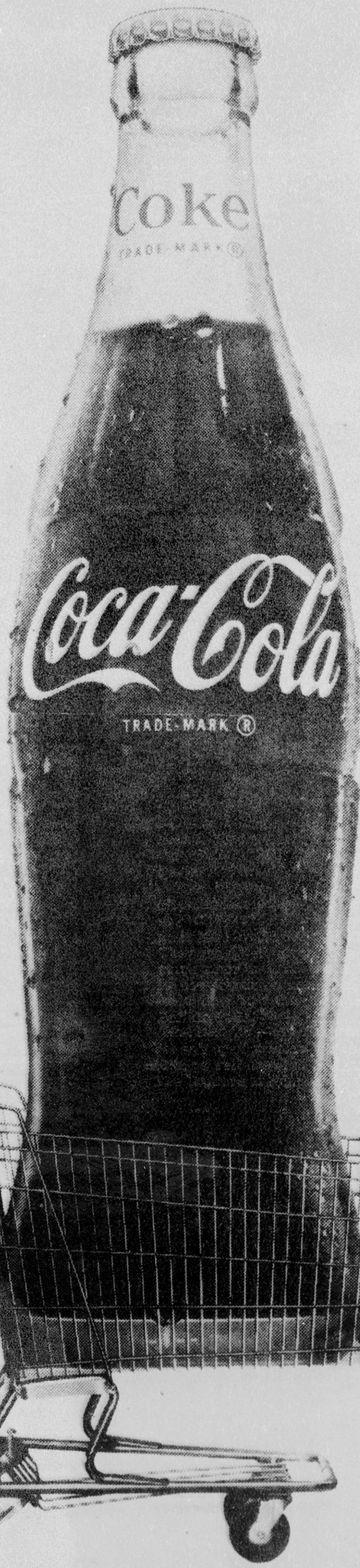
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
