

## Laborers' Skills To Be Upgraded

WASHINGTON - The skills and incomes of 1,500 construction laborers in 13 states and the District of Columbia will be improved through an on-the-job training program announced by Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz.

At least 80 percent of the trainees will be Negroes in the program to be operated by the Laborers' International Union of North America, AFL-CIO, in conjunction with various contractor organizations.

In announcing approval of the new program before the annual convention of the labor organization in St. Louis, Secretary Wirtz said it had been developed to help solve "the persistent skill shortages in more than 20 construction occupations."

"On-the-job training," he said, "is the best possible way to meet the present manpower needs of the Nation. Not only does OJT upgrade skills, also provides the unemployed worker with a job immediately and gives him assurance that he will have a job when he finishes his training. In addition, OJT provides for a working partnership between public and private training functions -- with the emphasis where it should be, on private responsibility. These programs will pay off in jobs for the unemployed and in needed skills for industry. They will also repay their cost to the government through the taxes on the increased income the workers earn. Everyone benefits from such a program."

The worker, while in on-the-job training, receives a wage, fringe benefits, and virtual assurance of a continuing job after the completion of training. On-the-job training is often combined with classroom instruction where basic knowledge in the occupation is needed.

The 1,500 trainees will be selected on the basis of their annual income record and the length of time they have been unemployed for lack of skills. The training period for each worker will be from 6 to 8 weeks, depending on the occupation and the geographic area where the occupational skill is in short supply.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare will assist in providing related instruction to those workers who need it to move into the more skilled jobs.

Final cost of the training program is expected to be in ex-

cess of \$1 million, covering both the cost of related instruction and on-the-job instruction. As the workers move into skilled categories with their new training, job training for the unemployed will be open at the semi-skilled level.

## Va State Is Admitted

PETERSBURG, Va. - Virginia State College, Petersburg, was one of 25 Southern colleges and universities and 18 secondary schools voted into membership recently at the annual two-day business meeting of the College Entrance Examination Board and the College Scholarship Service in New York.

This election boosts southern membership in the College Board to 167 colleges and universities and 41 secondary schools.

Representatives of the Board also voted for the first time in the organization's history to approve permanent associational membership for 35 of the nation's largest urban school systems including New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, Houston, Atlanta, the State Department of Education in Hawaii, and the Department of Education in the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.
