Bell checked out of the Downtowner Motel on Nov. 21, after paying a bill of \$31.80. It is believed that he secured the information needed and return to the base of operations. The bogus checks were very craftily printed. Most of the checks bore November dates.
The officers found \$57,000 worth of forged bank money orders. The checks were made out in sums as high as \$2,000 and it was one of that denomination that drew suspicion.
The trio also was found to have had identification cards of the persons to whom the checks were made out and in this way were able to get the checks cashed. Local officers called one of the persons, in Baltimore, and found that he had lost his wallet, containing his card to a "mugger" sometime this fall.

Among the checks recovered were several which bore the name of Armoce Steel Company and were alleged to have been given to persons who worked for that company. ed along." She was not able to remember what the family had for Christmas Dinner, but was sure it was enjoyed by all.
She attempted to piece together some of her early childhood and remembered that she was raised by her grandmother and that the family lived close to Durham, at that time. She told of how her grandmother would make "Johnny Cakes," and how she would ride in the horse-drawn wagon, with her to Durham, where she would sell the cakes to people in the factory.

When asked about how she enjoyed the Christmases she said that as a little girl she did not get many toys as they were a little hard to get, but that there was always plenty food. Being raised on a farm they could produce the food. She was

happy over the fact that she farmed most of her life, or at least until time began to take its toll.

She said that hers was a happy marriage and began at an early age. She told how she and her husband raised 10 children on the meager wages they were able to eke out. Only three of the children are not living, two boys and one girl, the oldest being 66. She has watched five generations of her family come into the world and have seen many of them go out, but she looks forward to enjoying Christmas with as many of them as possible.

She told of how her husband would strive to make Christmas meaningful to the family and the one thing that she regrets that her eye sight is failing and she cannot prepare the Christmas Dinner anymore. She recalled how she cooked backbone and made cakes many layers high.
