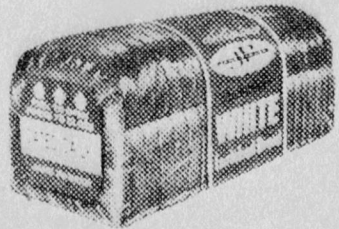

DuPont Makes Grants Of Over \$61,000 To Negro Colleges

WILMINGTON, Del. — The DuPont Company's program of aid to education for 1967 lists grants of more than \$61,000 to 13 predominantly Negro colleges. In addition, the company is granting a total of \$53,000 to two educational institutions and one technical society to conduct programs in the field of interracial education.

Awards to predominantly Negro colleges include a capital grant of \$15,000 to Dillard University, New Orleans, toward new wings on the science building.

Grants of \$5,000 each to advance and strengthen teaching in scientific and related fields were awarded to Bishop College, Dallas, Tex.; Dillard University; Fisk University, Nashville, Tenn.; Hampton Institute, Hampton, Va.; Knoxville College, Knoxville, Tenn.; and LeMoyne College, Memphis, Tenn.

One half of each of the above grants is for chemistry and the other half for subject which contribute importantly to education of scientists and engineers. The funds are to be used by the institution in ways they feel will most effectively advance their instruction in these subjects.

A grant of \$2,500 for strengthening the teaching of undergraduate engineers was awarded to Tuskegee Institute, Tuskegee, Ala. A grant of \$3,000 to support a postgraduate teaching assistant in the field of chemistry was awarded to Howard University, Washington, D. C.

Summer research grants of

\$2,200 each for teachers in the fields of chemistry, or mechanical engineering, or mechanical engineering were made to North Carolina A&T, Greensboro; Delaware State College, Dover, Del.; Morgan State College, Baltimore, Md.; North Carolina College, Durham, and Virginia State College, Petersburg, Va.

In the field of interracial education, the company gave \$28,000 to the University of Delaware for its Pre-college Opportunity Program — a program started last year to prepare high school students from culturally deprived backgrounds in northern Delaware to enter colleges or universities. DuPont had previously made grants totaling \$58,000 to draw up the Delaware plan and get it started. It was subsequently supported by additional Federal grants. Last summer the university conducted a successful program for 54 boys who had finished their junior year of high school.

DuPont is also continuing its support of a program for interracial education at Antioch College. In 1967 the company will give \$20,000 to Antioch to establish two science opportunity scholarships.

A grant of \$5,000 was made to the faculty interchange program of the American Society of Engineering Education. The purpose of this plan is to strengthen engineering education in predominantly Negro colleges through faculty interchange to top engineering schools.

GARDEN TIME

The last two columns have been devoted to the All-America flower and vegetable selections for 1967. It might be well to remind you again about the flower selection for 1966 and 1965 as these winners are still new and the most outstanding of their kinds.

1966 WINNERS
Cosmos, "Sunset," Golden Medal winner, the only red annual Klondyke cosmos. Sunset is an all-season bloomer, finally reaching three feet tall. Excellent for cutting and border display. It has airy fern-like foliage and easiest to grow, needing to transplanting.

Snappedragon, FL hybrid, "Bright Butterflies," Formula color mixture of these beautiful new tall, summer blooming, open faced snapdragons. All snappedragon colors, about 10 spikes of flower per plant and two and one-half to three feet tall. Really beautiful.

Pansy, FL hybrids, "Giant Majestic" Mixed, Formula color mixture of these huge pansies with large blotches, without equal.

Pansy, FL hybrid Giant Majestic, "White with Blotch," Largest, early, heat resisting, all season blooming, most spectacular pansy to date.

Sweet William, "Red Monarch," The only solid red annual blooming sweet William, for bedding and cutting. About 10 inches tall from spring plant-

ing with striking three-inch flower cluster on strong stems.

Verbena, "Amethyst," The only dwarf compact mid-blue or sky-blue verbena, much sought after and a beauty. About 6 inches tall, spreading 12 inches and free-blooming for low beds and edging walks, patios and borders.

Marigold, "Spun Yellow," Very early, large-mum-flowered bright yellow, covering 12-inch compact bushy plants. Another beauty.

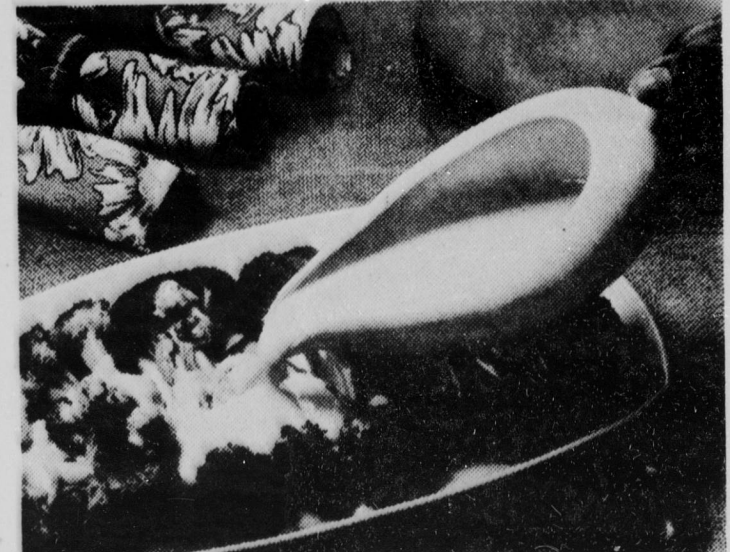
1965 WINNERS
Petunia, FL grandiflora, "Appleblossom," Supreme weather resistant, large fringed light salmon pink with tremendous flowering and color appeal for all purposes.

Delphinium, Connecticut Yankees, "First year blooming hardy perennial with largest flowers in blue shades to white on strong bushy plants with many spikes. Only one of its kind and most useful delphinium. It took over 25 years of persistent breeding to produce this marvelous strain.

Zinnia, FL hybrid giant cactus-flowered, "Yellow Zenith," Most colorful, brightest yellow, of these finest of all zinnias. Snappedragon, FL hybrid, "Floral Carpet Rose," Ever-blooming, dwarfest and most beautiful of this new bedding, edging and pot plant type. It has cushions of colorful blooms on six to eight-inch plants with about 25 spikes of bloom per plant.
