WASHINGTON (NPI) - The Metropolitan Police department has been told by D. C. Commissioner Walter N. Tobriner not to recruit policemen from the Deep South, even though the department has many vacancies. Tobriner was believed to fear that an influx of Southern bred policemen -- many of them white -- could aggravate racial tensions in the predominantly Negro City. His statement was answered by Rep. Bastl L. Whatener (D-N. C.) who said Tobriner was catering to the "professional haters of
