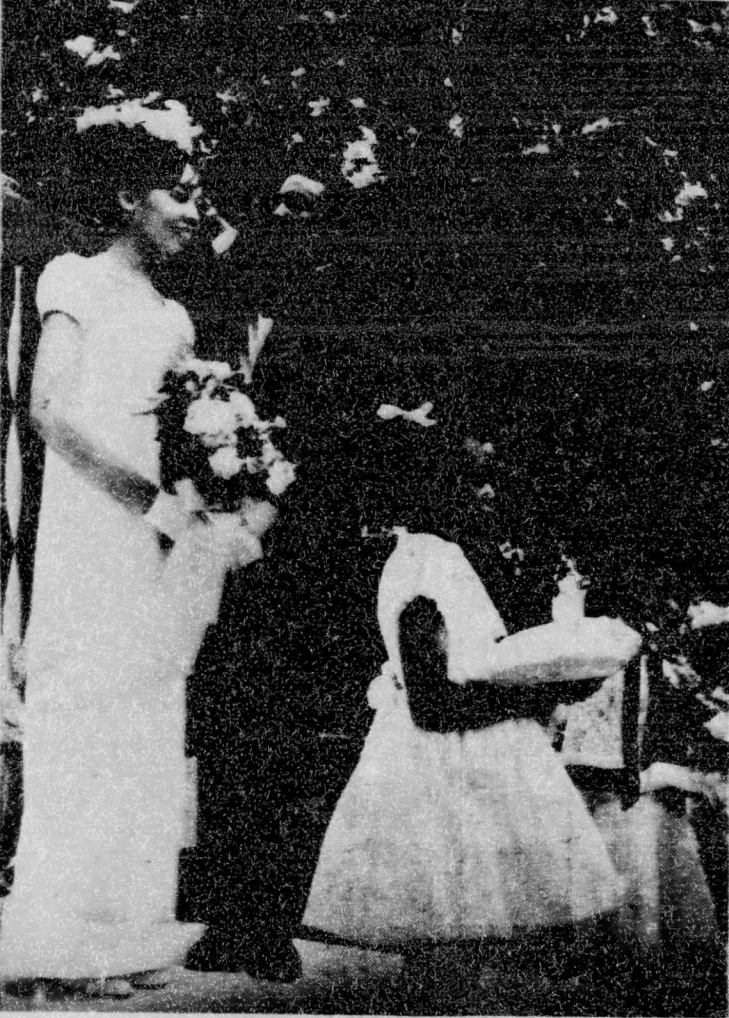

Southerners Not Wanted As DC Cops

WASHINGTON (NPI) - The Metropolitan Police department has been told by D. C. Commissioner Walter N. Tobriner not to recruit policemen from the Deep South, even though the department has many vacancies. Tobriner was believed to fear that an influx of Southern bred policemen -- many of them white -- could aggravate racial tensions in the predominantly Negro City. His statement was answered by Rep. Basil L. Whatner (D-N. C.) who said Tobriner was catering to the "professional haters of the South."

Donald Johnson, a top student at McKinley Upper Grade Center, was discovered by the Independent School Talent Search Program, a national effort to identify gifted but needy students, or prep schools. Exeter is providing the full scholarship.

Burke Given Labor Post

WASHINGTON, D. C. - The assignment of Nelson S. Burke to serve as Director of Programs for Equal Employment Opportunity in the Department of Labor's Manpower Administration programs was announced by Arthur A. Chapin.

In his new post, Mr. Burke will serve as senior assistant to Mr. Chapin, who is Special Assistant to Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz.

Prior to joining Mr. Chapin's staff, Mr. Burke was a Manpower Development Specialist with the Department's Neighborhood Youth Corps Program.

Before entering government service, he had served as teacher and Principal in the District of Columbia public schools; as Program Coordinator for the D. C. Department of Corrections Youth Center, at Corcoran, Va.; and as a Manpower Specialist for the Negro Youth Corps.

Mr. Burke, 49, is a native of Washington, D. C. He is a graduate of the District of Columbia Teachers College, holds a Masters of Arts degree from New York University, and has done post graduate work at Howard University, Catholic University, and Indiana University. He currently lectures in education at Howard University.

The youngster expects no problems at the prep school. "If anybody wants to be my friend, I'll be theirs," he said. He will enter the school in the fall.
