"BILL" BOPS BOB

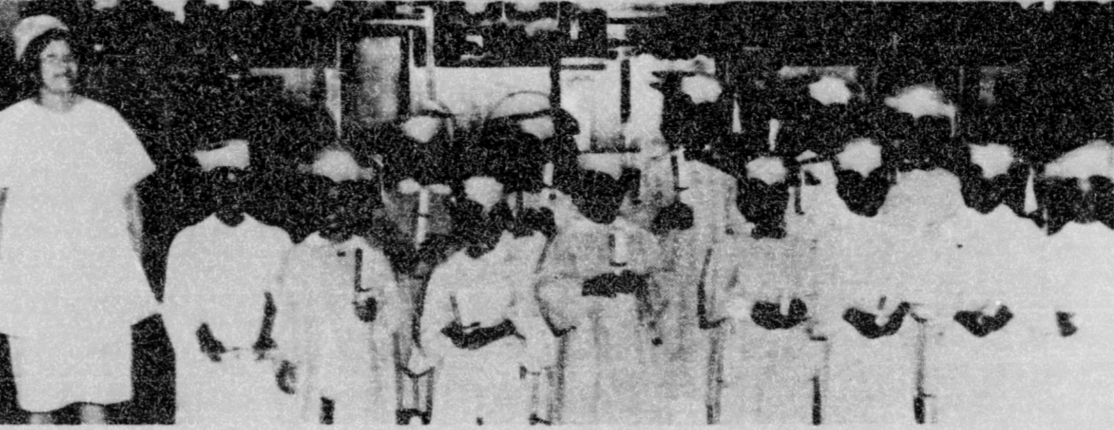
