They both made it clear that a strenuous effort is being made by the Counsel to formulate a twelve month program which will be designed to expand employment and training opportunities for non whites. This he said "included upgrading and promotions of persons as well as job entry, clerical as well as skilled and non skilled jobs.

Mr. Medlin pointed out seven steps in which they are implementing to eliminate discrimination due to race, creed or national origin. Three cheers for the Good Neighbor Counsel for the state of North Carolina. May we hope and trust that our local Good Neighbor Counsel will wake up and do as well.


