He appeared at the afternoon engagement and told the audience that he was advocating a black revolution, out of which would come black leaders to save the world. He was not specific in his appeal for Negro leadership, but a leadership of black leaders.
He did say that many young white people had come to the conclusion that white leadership had failed and that the world could only be saved by black leadership. He said this prediction was based on the conviction that he had with white students, some from Duke University, who had visited him at his Miami retreat.
Due to his being hospitalized he was not able to fill the night engagement and Edwin Brown, one of his aides, was pressed into service. Brown was not as belligerent as Powell, even though he recited many of the things Powell said in the afternoon.
Powell said the only real leaders left in the world were Ho Chi Minh, Mao Tse Tung and De Gaulle. Asked about Robert Kennedy as a leader of young whites, Powell said he was talking about leaders of the young and that Kennedy had not proved himself yet.
"The young people are fed up with a sick society, they want new leadership," Powell said. He defined a sick society as one which lets people die in Alabama for lack of food, castrates the law of his Education and Welfare Committee and engages in a "senseless war."
Of Vietnam, he said, "What if we do win? What have we won?"
Powell said total non-violence was passive. "Martin Luther King admitted to me two months ago, in private, that he believed the same thing."
He termed King's march on Washington "a leaderless revolution" and said he was trying to develop a revolution with leadership - black leadership.
Brown spoke in a more controlled, and in many ways a more effective manner than Powell. Brown was "born, raised and rooted" in Watts, in his own words.
Speaking of the "young people revolution" Brown said, "Does this mean violence? Not necessarily. Young whites must join us or we'll have a ball of a lot of trouble. If you make the mistake of not doing what's right you'll be responsible for what happens this summer."
Brown said that if whites, "accept us as black men, not Negroes, there may come a time we can live in harmony. Black people have a great deal of ability and they are sick and tired of being used."
"The time is so close you won't be able to sleep at night because you'll be wondering about it," he warned the students.
One message Powell would have liked him to bring, Brown said, was that in the fall elections, "Hold your vote... wait and see. I doubt there will be a Democratic convention. The black williams have vowed to stop the convention," Brown said.

turned into Camden and his car went into a spin. Seeing that Lee was in hot pursuit Pierce is said to have deserted the car and attempted to escape by foot. It was then that Pierce is said to have drawn his revolver and began shooting. The first shot is said to have gone through a window of Crump's house and to have damaged some clothing in the house. The bullet finally lodged in the mantle. Pierce is said to have fired five shots, but none of them appeared to be warning shots.
There was also the testimony that Pierce pleaded with Lee not to shoot him, after he had been cornered near a fence, after having been shot in the hip. Lee was taken to police headquarters and charged with assault with intent to kill resulting in personal injury. Police Chief Tom Davis immediately dismissed him from the force. He was booked for trial Monday morning, but it was learned that due to the fact Pierce was confined to Wake Memorial Hospital, in serious condition at that time, the case was continued until such time as the victim might be able to appear in court.
Pierce was reported in fair condition at Wake Memorial Hospital Tuesday evening.
