Nuclear Science Institute Set At Saint Aug.

Dr. Joseph Jones, Jr., academic dean and professor of biology at Saint Augustine's College, has announced that the annual Summer Institute in Nuclear Science for High School

Teachers of Science will begin on the campus June 9, and will end July 18. The program is jointly supported by the National Science Foundation and the United States Atomic Energy Commission.

The National Science Foundation provides a basic stipend of \$74 per week for Institute participants. Dependency allowances up to a maximum of four dependents. In addition, each participant will receive a round trip travel allowance up to eight cents per mile for a maximum travel allowance up to \$120. No charge are made for tuition and fees.

To be eligible to participate in this Summer Institute, the prospect should: a. be a high school teacher of natural science in grades 7-12; b. have had at least one year of college level training in biology, chemistry, physics and mathematics; c. have had at least three years of high school teaching experience; d. be recommended by his principal or immediate supervisor; e. show evidence of being able to benefit by attending the Institute.

The program of the Institute is designed to provide high school teachers of science, who have not had training in nuclear science, with a knowledge of some of the fundamental concepts in radiology, radiochemistry and radiobiology, including training in the use and handling of radioisotopes and radiation detection instruments.
