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### 'Hyde C'mty Only Start,' NC Warned

DURHAM - "Hyde County is just going to be the first of many counties in which black people are going to say this is your plan - not mine - and we will not honor it."

Dr. James T. Taylor, who as acting chairman of the North Carolina Good Neighbor Council has spent many hours trying to avert racial crisis in Hyde County and other areas, predicted in a recent speech to North Carolina College alumni that Hyde County's problems will be repeated in many other areas "unless the total community is involved in working out desegregation plans."

"Our schools...have become the testing ground of the ability of black and white communities to work together and share power," Dr. Taylor said. He asked, "Is it possible for a community to involve community leaders of both races in working out a desegregation plan that is in keeping with the law of the land, that utilizes the resources of both communities, and that recognizes and respects the differences, as well as the similarities of both racial groups?"

Taylor said students as well as parents and teachers must be involved in desegregation planning. If black students are "swallowed up by the white schools," Dr. Taylor said, "the black student will remain a visitor in his own school. And if

### Malcolm X Felt US After Him

NEW YORK - Mrs. Betty Shabazz, widow of Malcolm X, said Monday that her husband predicted his own death at the hands of the U. S. Government because of what he knew.

In an interview appearing in the current issue of Look magazine, the woman whose husband has become a martyr of the black revolution said:

"I believe what Malcolm told me. He believed, after careful analysis, that the Government would have him killed, but would use the Black Muslims (as killers) because of the friction between himself and them."

"He learned some things the Government did not want him to know."

Two Black Muslims and a third man have been sentenced to life imprisonment for gunning down Malcolm in New York's Audubon Ballroom in 1965, after he left the movement to build one of his own.

Although some observers feel that Malcolm's last days raise a promise of racial integration, his widow said that it would not work.

"Blacks have been trying to integrate for nearly four centuries," she declared in Look, "and they have failed. Integration has failed. We have been forced into separate neighborhoods and separate lives, and now, we have to go our own way."

"Now, we blacks are going to rule ourselves..."

One of five widows of top leaders or sympathizers in the cause of black liberation killed by gunfire in 1960's, Mrs. Shabazz said.

WASHINGTON - Richard Milhous Nixon may, at long last, have discovered the Negro community.

Having virtually ignored it during his Presidential campaign, Nixon suddenly appears anxious to woo the very people who overwhelmingly voted against him last year.

First, there was his unannounced visit to a Negro area of the nation's capital.

During his campaign, Nixon seemed to go out of his way to stay out of the Negro areas. But now that he was President, things were different.

Then came his statement, during a press conference, that he intended to be President of all the people and to gain the

### Woman, 50, Slain, Cops Nab Hubby

RILEY HILL - "If that bullet had been one inch higher, it would have missed her altogether."

These were the words of Wake County Coroner Marshall W. Bennett in describing the difference in life and death for Mrs. Lucy Robinson, 50-year-old housewife of David Robinson, 53, both of whom lived at Route 2, Wendell, near here. Robinson has been charged with murder in his wife's death last Saturday afternoon.

Mrs. Robinson was dead on arrival at Wake Memorial Hospital, Raleigh, where she was rushed after the shooting. The incident took place at 3:30 p.m. Saturday.

Coroner Bennett said a witness to the shooting told him that Robinson shot and killed his wife by accident.

Ulysses Taylor, 60, Zebulon, Route 2, the witness, told the coroner that he and another man, Sam Spruill, Wake Forest, Route 2, drove up to the Robinson house in Mr. Spruill's automobile. Taylor went inside, while Spruill remained in his car.

"Robinson had been drinking," said Bennett. Taylor told me that when he was arrested, he was drunk.

### Raleigh Woman, 105, Has Birthday On Valentine's Day

Saint Valentine's Day means a lot of things to a lot of people. To Mrs. Hattie Williams Stokes, 320 Maple Street, last Friday marked the one-hundred and fifth year of her life. A few close friends were on hand to help her mark this milestone in her life.

Born February 14, 1865 on a plantation in Fairfax County, South Carolina, while the guns of the Civil War still could be heard, Mrs. Stokes was slightly more than one year of age when President Abraham Lincoln signed the Declaration of Independence, freeing her mother and father from the shackles of slavery to which they had been bound many years prior to her birth.

The amazing little woman has not had any teeth for a number of years because "she doesn't like false teeth," said her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Ruth Drew Stokes, married to Mrs. Stokes's son, Allen, who lives with his family at 1900 Oakwood Avenue. However, the centennarian can eat anything she wants with her finely-molded gums.

A warrant, charging "accessory" has been drawn up against Ayscue in connection with the February 7 slaying of the cab driver. Although bond for Ayscue was set at \$15,000, he was still languishing in the Wake County Jail Tuesday night. Rowland was reported missing Wednesday night, February 5.
