



March 1, 1896 - Abyssinians defeated Italians at Adowa.

March 1, 1922 - Arthur G. Free, upon the resignation of J. F. Costello, became Recorder of Deeds in Washington.

March 1, 1927 - The first brick was laid in Morris Memorial building, Nashville, Tenn. The mortgage-paying was celebrated in 1942.

March 2, 1867 - Reconstruction bill passed over President Andrew Johnson's veto. March 2, 1863 - Frederick Douglass appealed to Blacks

to join Union Forces. March 3, 1834 - Bishop Isaac Lane, CME leader - educator, was born in Jackson, Tenn. March 3, 1867 - Howard Uni-

March 3, 1887 - James M. Trotter was confirmed as Recorder of Deeds, succeeding Frederick Douglass.

March 4, 1884 - Peter Ogden was granted charter from England to organize Negro Odd Fellows.

March 5, 1770 - Crispus Attucks became first martyr of 'merican independence. A sailor, he was killed in the Boston Commons massacre and was among first to shed blood.

March 6, 1820 - Slavery protected by Missouri Compromise.

March 6, 1857 - Dred Scott decision of the U.S. Supreme court, which denied Blacks the right of citizenship, was rendered

March 6, 1863 - Bishop Daniel A. Payne, AME leader, pur-chased Wilberforce university at Xenia, Ohio, from the Methodist Episcopal church for \$10,000.

March 6, 1957 - The Gold Coast in West Africa was granted independence from Great Britain, and became known as Ghana. The first and only African premier and president of the country was Kwame Nkrumah who has since been deposed and is in exile in Guinea.

March 7, 1520 - Hernando Cortez, Spanish soldier of fortune, had Blacks in his party conquering Mexico.
