
THE VETERAN'S CORNER

EDITOR'S NOTE: Below are authoritative answers by the Veterans Administration to some of the many current questions from former servicemen and their families. Further information on veterans benefits may be obtained at any VA office.

Q. - In determining a veteran's entitlement to a nonservice - connected pension, does the Veterans Administration consider the veteran's gross income or his taxable income? I am over 65 years of age and have no dependents. I have not applied for a pension previously because my income was above the \$1,800 ltmit. This year, however, I expect to incur unusually heavy medical expenses that will bring my taxable income under that limit. Will this make any difference?

A. - Entitlement to a VA pension is based on gross income from which certain exclusions are deducted by the VA. If you file a claim, list your gross income and its sources, all legal exclusions will be deducted. Medical expenses do not reduce your gross income
