"LIMITATION ON BENEFITS TO

Memo no. 6004-2, Limitation On Benefits to Those Voluntarily Poor reached our office March II. This is an OEO instruction memo. It is in response to section 611, of the Economic Opportunity Act.

"The director shall take such action as may be necessary to assure that, in determining a person's eligibility for benefits under this act on account of his poverty, such person will not be deemed to meet the poverty criteria if his lack of income results from his refusal without good cause to seek or accept employment commensurate with his health, age, education and ability."

This memo determines the person's eligibility based on the section of the EOA referred to above. It spells out six conditions that can not stand in the way of a person's eligi-
