Mrs. Thelma Cumbo Lennon delivered a challenging Woman's Day message on Sunday, March 16, at St. Matthew Baptist Church, Lenoir Road, at the eleven o'clock hour.

Using as a theme, "A Wise Mother's Counsel To Her Son," she based her address on expressions from Proverbs 31, the tenth through the 31st verses. "Nothing can add to this beauty of the Bible por-

tration Training School for Women and Girls; Jane Edna Hunter, founder of the Working Girls' Home Association, standing today as the Phyllis Wheatley Association in Cleveland. She had dedicated her life to unselfish service in the elevation of Negro girls and women as a tribute to her mother and grandmother. She concluded with quotes from Langston Hughes' "Mother To Son."

Music for the occasion was furnished by an all-women's choir and the Tiny Tots choir. Mrs. J. D. Lockley led the responsive reading, Mrs. Amy Williams read the scripture lesson, Mrs. Ella Mae Winston offered prayer, Miss Joyce Ann Brooks read the announcements and recognized the visitors.

The ushers, attired in glistening white, lifted the offering, after which, Mrs. Bessie Riddick offered prayer. The speaker was introduced by Mrs. Vanzie Lee Bunch, Mrs. Martha J. Funds For New Building Asked By FSC Proxy

The president of Fayetteville State College says he wonders what is happening when another institution is given a \$2 million gym when we can't even get \$1 million for an academic building.

Dr. Rudolph Jones, good naturedly chided a legislative subcommittee Thursday for past discriminations to predominantly Negro schools.

"I had hoped by 1969 we had got to the place where there was no rash discrimination," Jones told the Joint Appropriations Subcommittee on Education.

Jones requested \$980,000 to build a classroom building, but it was not recommended by the Advisory Budget Commission. However, the commission did recommend one million for a gym at Pembroke State College.

"We're due this classroom and I think we ought to have it," Jones told the sub-committee. "There's such a thing as right and wrong."

Jones asked for capital improvements totaling about \$1.3 million during the next biennium.

He did not request any additional "B" budget money, saying he expected to get an equitable share of the \$8 million equalization fund recommended for distribution through the Board of Higher Education. The "B" budget covers new and expanded programs.

"Don't be misled," Jones said. "We do need some 'B' budget money, but I emphasize the fact I hope you will appropriate this money to the state board."

Meanwhile, Dr. William E. Highsmith, president of Asheville - Biltmore College, requested \$219,000 for an infirmary and about \$150,000 for additional equipment and faculty members who teach 10 months instead of nine.
