The president of Fayetteville State College says he wonders what is happening when another institution is given a \$2 million gym when we can't even get \$1 million for an academic building." Dr. Rudolph Jones, good na-

turedly chided a legislative subcommittee Thursday for past discriminations to predom inately Negro schools. "I had hoped by 1969 we had got to the place where

there was no rash discrimination," Jones told the Joint Appropriations Subcommittee on Education. Jones requested \$980,000 to build a classroom building, but it was not recommended by the

However, the commission did recommend one million for a gym at Pembroke State College. "We're due this classroom and I think we ought to have it, "? Jones told the sub-committee. "There's such a thing as right

and wrong." Jones asked for capital improvements totaling about \$1.3 million during the next bien-

nium. He did not request any additional "B" budget money, saying he expected to get an equitable share of the \$8 million equalization fund recommended for distribution through the Board of Higher Education, The "B" budget covers new and

expanded programs. "Don't be misled," Jones said. "We do need some "B" budget money, but I emphasize the fact I hope you will appropriate this money to the state board."

Meanwhile, Dr. William E. Highsmith, president of Asheville - Bilimore College, requested \$219,000 for an infirmary and about \$150,000 for additional equipment and pay for faculty members who teach 10 months instead of nine.
