

Wake County's Cancer Society Holds Crusade Month Luncheon

This is Cancer Crusade Month.

The Board of Directors of the Wake County Cancer Society held a luncheon meeting Tuesday at 1 p.m. at the Hillsborough Street YMCA.

Guest speaker was Dr. Arthur E. Davis, Jr., chief pathologist at Rex Hospital here. Dr. Millard E. Bethel, president of the Society, presided with invocation being offered by P. A. Griffiths.

Miss Becky Bowden, dental advisory chairman, reminded all of the Oral Cancer Screening Clinic's "Operation Open Wide" to be held at the Wake County Health Department, 3010 New Bern Avenue, on Sunday, May 4, from 2-5 p.m. Examinations are free and all persons in this area are urged to take advantage of it.

Dan Boney, Crusade Chairman, introduced Charles Gaddy, honorary Crusade Chairman, and Mrs. Donald Enderle, Raleigh Residential Chairman, both of whom made timely remarks.

Mrs. Ruth Hancock, Publicity Chairman for the past two years, was cited for her outstanding work.

Dr. Davis, in addition to his duties as pathologist at Rex Hospital is also Director of the Cancer Detection Clinic at the Wake County Health Department.

The main part of his discourse consisted of showing slides of the effects of lung cancer.

The speaker said, "Once upon a time people died from infections. That time is no more. In the main, we are dying of self-induced conditions. These matters are no longer in the hands of your doctor, but in your hands."

He stressed the need for peo-

ple to visit their cancer detection clinic early so that if the dread disease is discovered, there will be time to cure it before it develops into a terminal stage.

"Excessive smoking is now almost a national disaster," said Dr. Davis as he prepared to show the slides. He was assisted in this by Dr. Lauren J. Kassa, chief pathologist at Wake Memorial Hospital here.

"Lung cancer is the most common cause of death from cancer in the American male today. Heavy smoking and cancer bronchitis are related. Literally millions of man-hours are lost every year because of bronchitis absenteeism."

After showing a slide of the human bronchus, Dr. Davis said: "Ninety-five percent of lung cancer is caused by smoking, although some cancer is induced by the inhalation of residue from factories and other man-made devices."

He also described the inside of a lung as looking like a sponge.

Dr. Davis said the overall cure rate for lung cancer is only five percent.

"If a person has emphysema, nothing short of a lung transplant will save his life," Dr. Davis assured his listeners. Although he admitted that he smoked an occasional cigarette ("a pack will last me three weeks"), the physician - surgeon said that is the amount of cigarettes that a person smokes daily that has the final determination of the severity of that person's lung condition.

A Minnesota native, Dr. Davis also urged that people take advantage of all cancer detection devices, all of which are free.

The one-hour meeting was attended by officers of the So-

ciety, including Mrs. Jacqueline Chamblee, executive secretary, and Mrs. Addie G. Stroud, treasurer.

The Cancer Detection Clinic is open each weekday to women. You may make an appointment by dialing 833-1655.

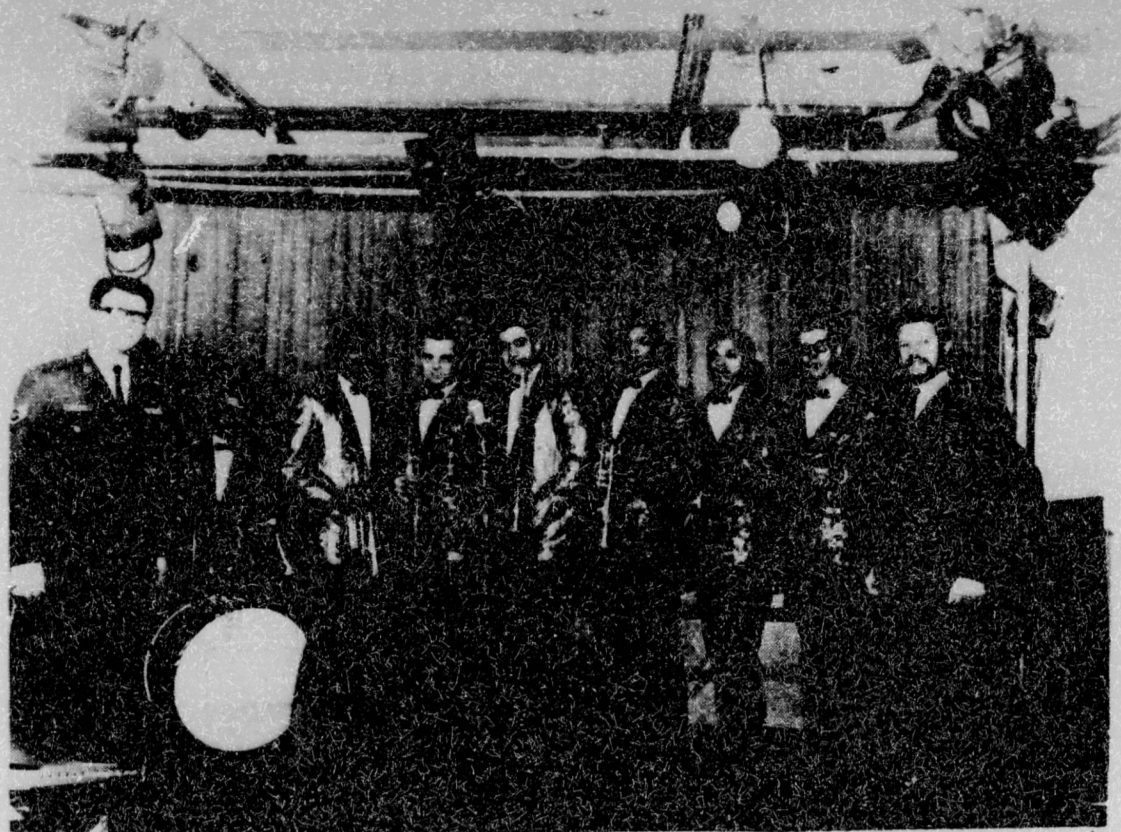
