

Southside Announces Annual Spring Cleanup, Pickup Drive

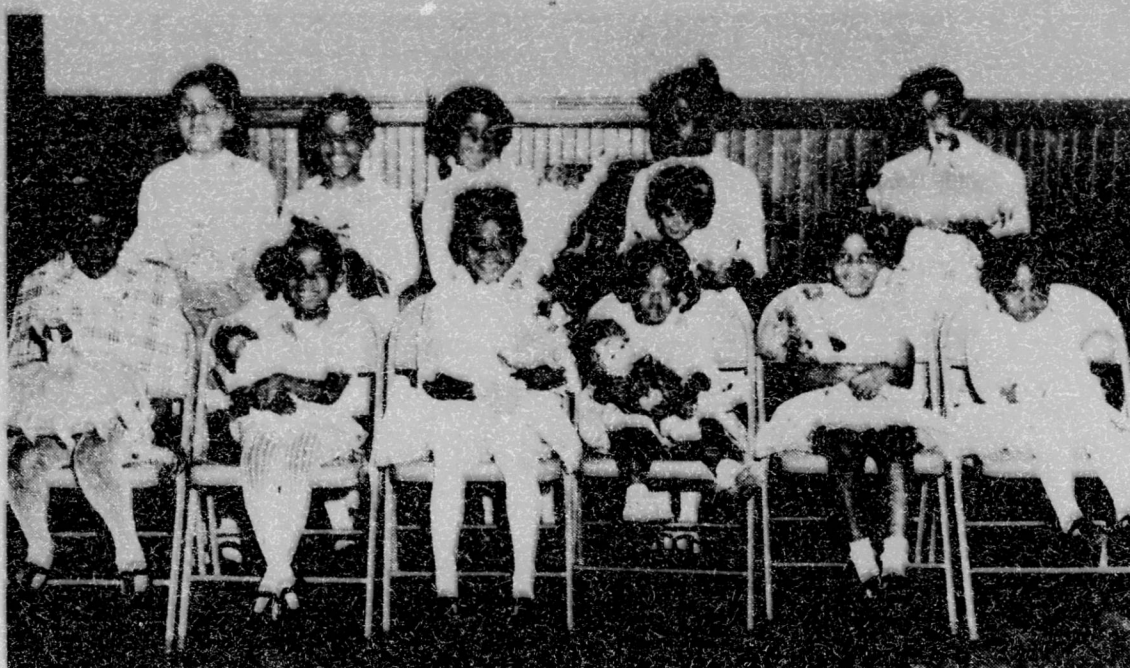
TRASH PICKS-UPS EVERY WEDNESDAY AND THURSDAY
The annual Spring Clean-up effort for the citizens of Southside Urban Renewal area will be observed from April 28 through May 30. The Redevelopment Commission of Raleigh will be supporting and cooperating with the Poor People Organization, Southside Peoples Organization, and Waldrop Community Action Center. Already the Redevelopment Commission has made special arrangements with the City of Raleigh Public Works Department for special trash pickups in the Urban Renewal area each week on Wednesdays. Also, each week on Thursdays, through the cooperation of the organizations and the people on Southside, a truck will be rented to alleviate some of the trash on Southside.

In Southside of the City of Raleigh will cooperate with the program and take pride in his neighborhood by cleaning up the trash and junk that has accumulated over the past few months. Only as all citizens work together and do their part can their cleaning campaign be a success and make our neighborhood and city a better place in which to live.
