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The Role Of Electric Co-ops

In the 1970's, rural electric cooperatives "will move into the private money market for financing, they will pay Federal, state and local taxes or reasonable equivalents, and they will accept regulation similar to that applied to investor-owned utilities."

This prediction was made Tuesday by Shearon Harris, president of Carolina Power & Light Company, in an address on "Rural Electrification in the '70's" before the American Power Conference in Chicago.

"Mutual interests," he said, "far outnumber today's differences between investor-owned companies and cooperatives. The seventies hold positive prospects of cooperation toward resolving our common problems under a common set of rules."

Harris predicted that regulation of the co-ops will be broadened as a result of the cooperatives themselves recognizing its virtues. He suggested that with their acceptance of regulation, electric cooperatives will achieve stronger territorial integrity.

and that regulation which traditionally has assured equitable treatment for investor-owned utilities' customers will benefit co-op customers too. Harris expects that cooperatives in the seventies will be fewer in number and larger in size as the result of consolidations. They will serve more customers in clearly defined territories with efficient service at a higher level of reliability.
