Mrs. Scales is an active member of First Congregational Church, having served as representative at several Kings Mountain conference.

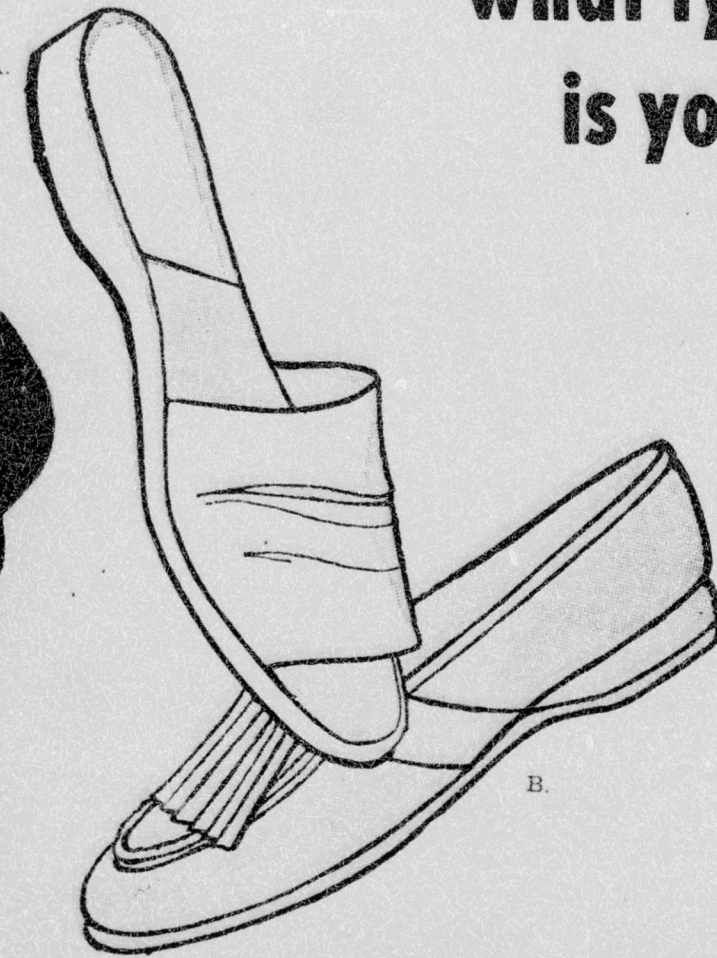
superintendent of the Sunday School, choir member, assistant to the youth group coordinator, Larry Stroud, and president of the Willing Workers' Emergency Club.

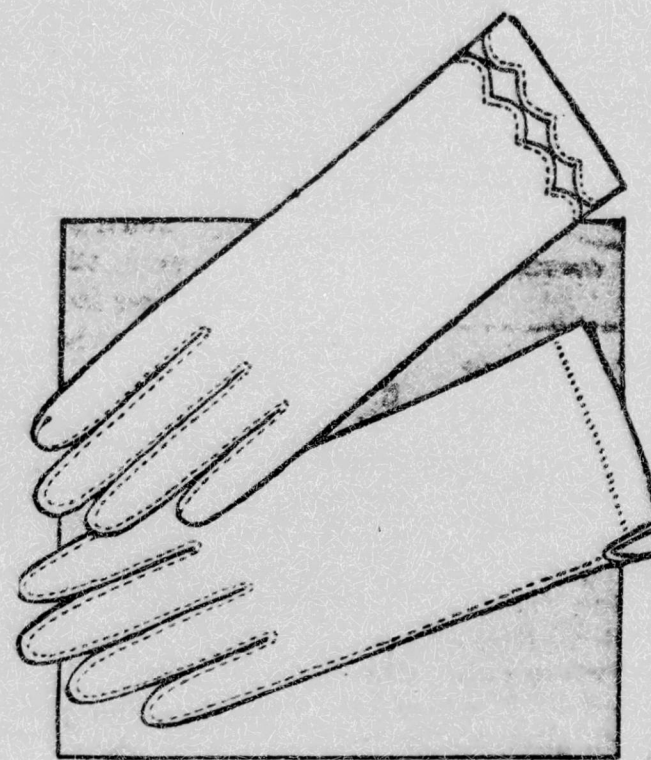

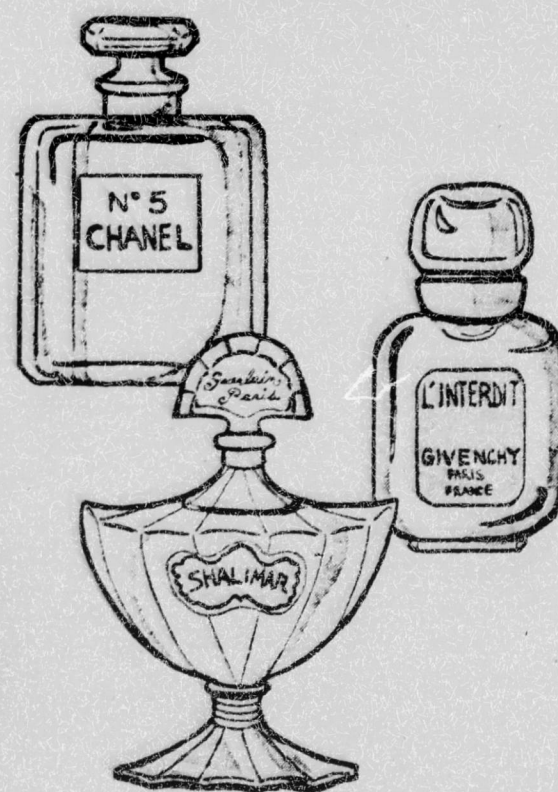
