

## **Question-Calling**

BUCK HILL FALLS, Pa. -"Black consciousness is calling into question the operation and programs of councils of churches," declared the Rev. Eugene Turner, Black coordinator metropolitan missions, United Presbyterian Church U. S. A. Speaking at a panel discussion during the annual meeting of the U.S. Conference of the World Council of Churches, he said, "Black people of America have gotten hold of something called Black consciousness that refutes white Christianity's relevance to them. This is not to suggest Blacks are turning away from Christ; it is to affirm that God may be using Black consciousness to call His Church back into His fold."
