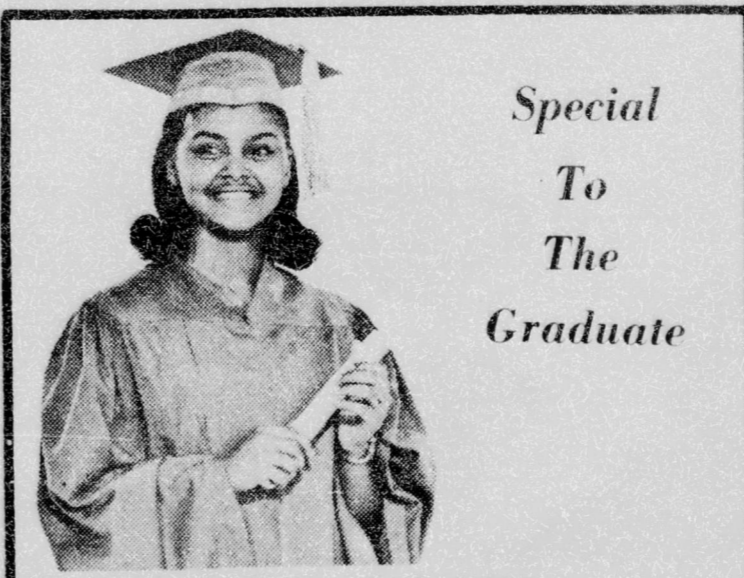

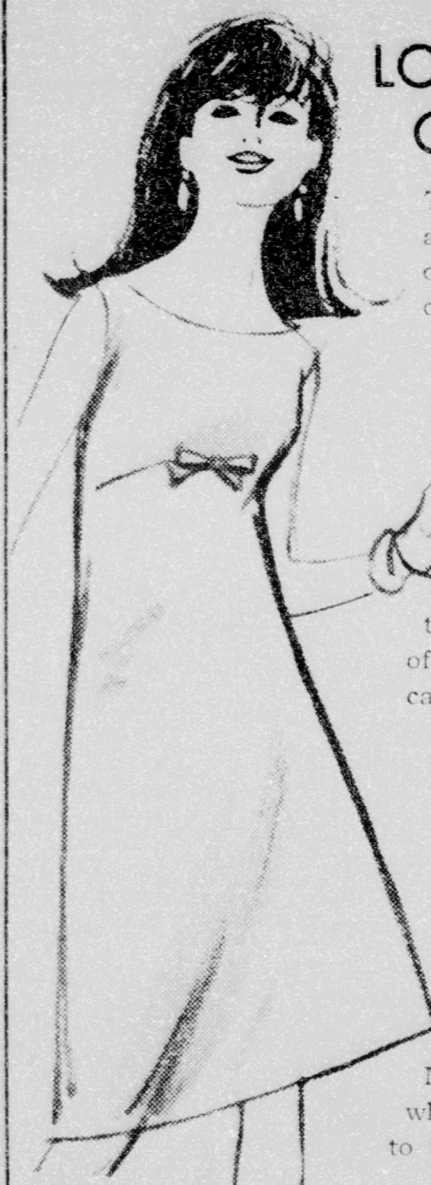
The recital, a requirement of all seniors at Shaw who have
