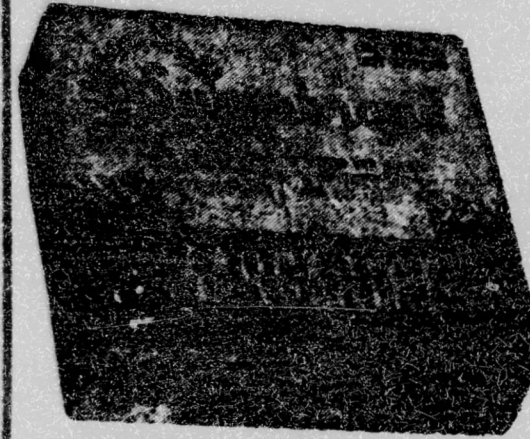

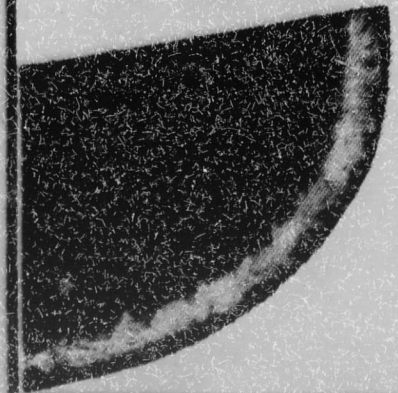

## Winn-Dixie

### Sales Advance

A 15.63 percent sales advance was registered by Winn-Dixie food stores during the 44 weeks ended May 3, compared with the like period last year. Volume totaled \$1,052,200-763 against \$909,942,501, a gain of \$142,258,292. An increase also was reported for the four weeks ended May 3, when sales amounted to \$98,783,805, an increase of \$11,658,837 or 13.38 percent. The company operates 785 supermarkets throughout the Southeast compared with 743 a year ago.
