

J.C. Smith Makes Changes In Faculty

CHARLOTTE - Ten new appointments have been made to the faculty and staff of Johnson C. Smith University for the school year 1969-70. This number includes six faculty members who will be returning to the University this fall in new positions.

Dr. Joseph E. Thompson has been appointed to serve as director of the 102 year-old school's College Education Advancement Project (CEAP). Dr. Edwin Thompkins will become a professor of Education. Rev. Calvin A. Hood has been named Dean of Students and Mrs. Lou P. Benson is the newly appointed Dean of Women. Mrs. Maxine F. Scott is now an instructor of English and Mr. Joseph L. Alston has been picked to assume the duties of Head Basketball Coach.

Formerly Dr. Thompson served as a professor of Reli-

gious Education and Philosophy. Dr. Thompson previously Dean of the Theological Seminary will transfer to the Department of Education when the Seminary moves to Atlanta's Interdenominational Theological Center. Mr. Hood has been an associate professor of Religious Education at the University for fifteen years. Mrs. Benson has been the school's guidance counselor for the past two years. Mrs. Scott has worked as an assistant in English in Smith's language laboratory since she graduated summa cum laude from the University in 1965. Mr. Alston continues as an instructor of physical education and succeeds William D. McCoullough as Head Basketball Coach.

Four persons will be joining the faculty and staff for the first time this fall. They are William Davis, instructor of

physical education and assistant football coach; George Stinson, instructor of Business Administration; James D. Bass, assistant professor of Political Science, and Miss Sandra T. Bates, assistant Public Relations Officer.

Mr. Davis came to the university from Maryland State College, Princess Anne, where he previously taught physical education. Mr. Stinson formerly worked with Bendix Corporation in Kansas City, Missouri. Mr. Bass comes from Wofford College in Spartanburg, S. C. where he was instructor of political sciences. Miss Bates, immediate past editor of the campus newspaper, graduated magna cum laude from the University in May.

Warner Gets Ford Grant

CHARLOTTE - Lovette A. Warner, director of Alumni Affairs at Johnson C. Smith University, has been selected as a recipient of a Ford Foundation grant to do further training in educational development.

The grant will enable Mr. Warner to serve a one year internship in the office of the Vice President for Development at Temple University in Philadelphia. The goal of the Ford program is to enhance the development of offices at predominantly black colleges by financ-

ing internships for two persons from each of the selected colleges.

Curtis O. Peters, assistant in the Office of Public Relations, is the other person chosen from Smith to receive the grant from Ford. He will serve in the development office of Fordham University in New York City.

Other colleges participating in the Ford program include Shaw University, Fisk University, Miles College, Benedict College, and Bethune-Cookman College.

More than nine out of every ten working people in the United States are in work covered by social security, according to Robert A. Flynn, Social Security Manager in Raleigh. Mr. Flynn states that individuals need to know their rights and responsibilities in order to obtain the full benefit of their social security protection.

Social security is not only a matter of getting the money when it is due, but of knowing of the protection that is there. "When planning retirement or your family's security at your death or disability, consider the value of your social security protection," urges Mr. Flynn. "Know what you and your fami-

ly can expect to receive if you become disabled, die, or when you retire."

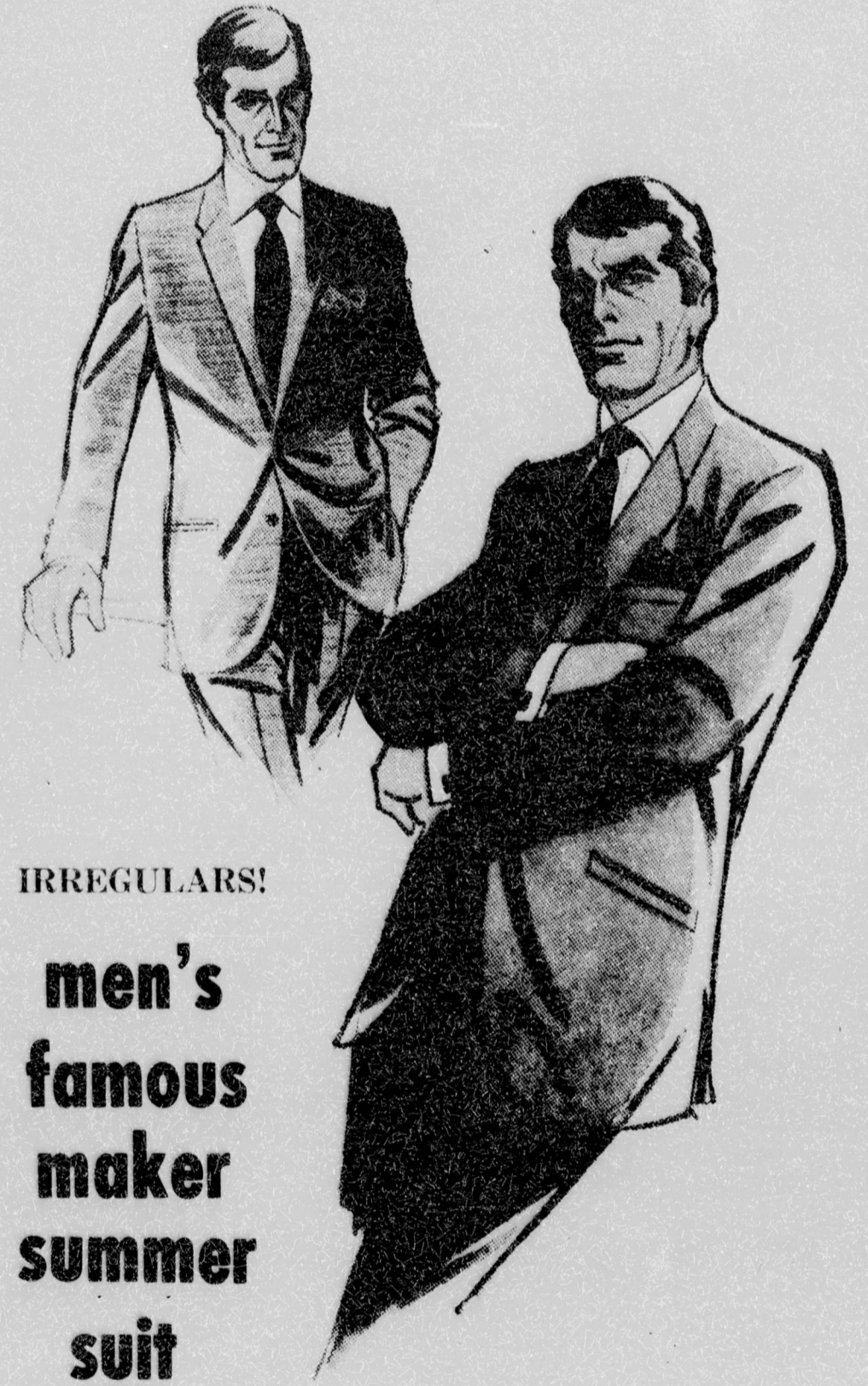

Denounced

WASHINGTON - (UPI) - The Nixon administration's opposition to extending the 1965 Voting Rights act has been denounced by Clarence Mitchell of the NAACP. The administration has proposed a nationwide ban on literacy tests and an attack on other impediments to voting, as substitutes for the Voting Rights act. The proposals, Mitchell said, amount to "a sophisticated but nonetheless deadly way of thwarting the progress we have made."

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
