
ATA's National Tennis Tourney To Feature Arthur Ashe


HOUSTON - Texas Southern University has set up two grid games at the Astrodome this fall, including its homecoming tilt against Grambling College. The return to the Astrodome is the result of an experiment conducted last year to determine the drawing power of the two teams. This year, TSU will face Grambling on Nov. 15; and return Nov. 27 to contest Prairie View A&M in the Thanksgiving Classic.

BIRMINGHAM - Black athletes have filed a suit in federal court seeking a change of athletic policy at the University of Alabama. Named defendants in the suit are the university, its president, executive committee chairman, and grid coach Paul Bryant. The plaintiffs seek a court order to have the school recruit Black athletes "as intensely as they do whites," and increase football scholarships and grant-in-aids proportionately, beginning with the September term.






