The W. W. Club held its last meeting for the summer at the lovely home of Mrs. Edna Haywood on Sunday afternoon, July 20.

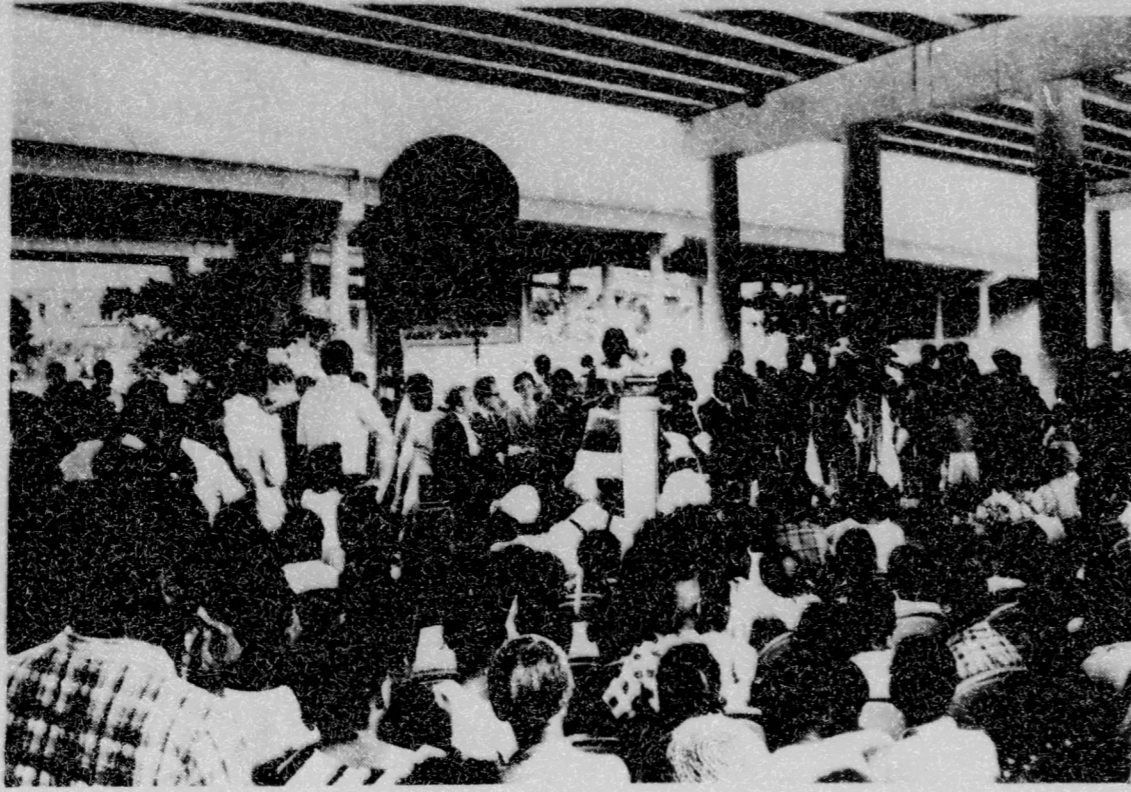

Dr. Lyons Assumes The Presidency Of Fayetteville State University

"From Unreality to Reality in Education, in a Changing Society" was the subject used by Dr. Charles A. Lyons, Jr., president, Fayetteville State University, as he addressed to Saint Augustine's College summer school graduates August 2.

Dr. Lyons stated that much of what we are doing in education is unreal just as is our society. We are confronted with paradoxes. One segment of society lives in such luxury as to be blind to the remaining segment.

He declared that "we are able to leave the planet and go to a heavenly body, bring samples of the moon, and yet in the face of all this progress, hunger and poverty stalk the country."

The answers that some people give to the growing unrest is more heavily armed police forces. We know more about analysis and the prediction of economic and social trends than ever before and still we are overwhelmed by events, because we act only in crises.

Dr. Lyons stated that sometimes when we look at our own records we find that we have some of the same problems in education. Many of our teacher-education programs assume that we will be teaching nice clean middle class college bound children. "What is the reality? In 14 of the largest cities, one third of the children are malnourished and culturally deprived. We tend to forget the real conditions from which our pupils come."

In conclusion, he challenged those who teach to remember that "you cannot afford to disregard the personalities and community backgrounds of the persons you teach, no matter how learned and grounded you may be in your subject matter." He got to take more with you than methodology and su-

ject matter. Those who do not teach must also prepare for some kind of community leadership.

The speaker was introduced by Dr. Prezell R. Robinson, president of Saint Augustine's College. Prayer was offered by Father Clyde E. Beatty, chaplain at college.

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Alphas Pick 'Black Power' Speakers For Convention

HOUSTON-(NPD)-Heading the array of speakers to address the 63rd anniversary convention of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., which meets at the Shamrock Hilton Hotel, Aug. 2-7 are Atty. Belford V. Lawson, Jr., Washington, D. C., past general president of the Alphas; Dr. Nathan Wright, Jr., New York, president, Empowerment Associates, Inc., and Theodore M. Berry, director, Community Action Program, Washington, D. C.

The trio of speakers will assist in exploring the convention theme, "Black Power, a Creative Force in America's Complete Development." The theme has been split into five general areas—art, education, religion, economics and government, under the coordinating guidance of Dr. Thomas D. Pawley II, chairman, education foundation.

Moderating the arts symposium will be Mal Goode, ABC-TV commentator; and religion will be chaired by the Rev. Wyatt Tee Walker.

Highlight of the convention will be a job interview program instituted by the fraternity and conducted throughout the sessions. More than 50 major corporations will be represented in this segment, which is being directed by L. H. Stanton, New York.
