

"going to happen to him," He reportedly left some 25 tape recordings for police officials, containing notes and instructions on who to get and how to deal with his expected murderer or murderers.

An offical of the State Attorney General's Office said last week, "We're going to do what Henderson wanted us to do and God knows if there is more than one involved in this murder, we will find out and bring every last one of them to justice."





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
