

Charles Evers, the first black man ever to head a southern town, revealed Tuesday night that local police broke upanattempt by three white mento kill him outside a store in a shopping center here. Evers, whose brother Medgar was slain by a sniper in Jackson in 1963, said one of the men had been arrested.
