Third Of U.S. Blacks In Poverty, Says Census Bureau

WASHINGTON - (NPI) - A third of the nation's nonwhites were below the poverty level during 1968, the Census bureau has reported.

But on the brighter side, 8-30,000 nonwhite people moved out of poverty in 1968, This was 40 per cent of the 2-million Americans who escaped poverty in that year.

While a third of Black people are poor, only 10 per cent of the nation's whites are poor, the figures indicated.

The Census bureau pointed a picture of decreasing poverty in the nation.

In 1968, 13 per cent of Americans were below the poverty line, compared to 14 per cent in 1967, 15 per cent in 1966, and 22 per cent in

Federal officials set the poverty line at \$3,550 for a nonfarm family of four

Median family income rose to \$8,600 annually in 1968 -- an per cent gain over 1967. The Negro median income of \$5,-630 compared with \$8,937 for whites.

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
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
