1. Which of these 20th century wars was the first in which large numbers of Black soldiers served in integrated units?







CAMP PENDELTON, Calif. - (NPI) - The Marine Corps, noted for its brutal so-called "making-a-fighting-man-ourof-you" program, finally got a taste of its own modicine last week when some 200 marine prisoners in the local brig caught five guards unaware and pelted them with rocks. The incident occurred following public acknowledgment by the base commander that there 's severe overcrowding in the brig and that marine prisoners have been "abused." Most of some 796 prisoners are serving sentences for unathorized absences.
