WASHINGTON, D. C. -The U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development last week announced publication of Selected Abstracts of Planning Reports, a compilation of summaries of planning studies supported by HUD through the country.

The studies were carried out as part of the Comprehensive Planning Assistance Program,


reflect the beginnings of planning that deals with housing, law enforcement, and other major issues."


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
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
