

## A&T Adds New Faculty Members: 10 Hold Doctorates

GREENSBORO - Ten instructors, all holding Ph.D. degrees, are among the 36 new teachers joining the faculty at A&T State University this semester.

Dr. Lewis C. Dowdy, A&T president, Thursday announced the appointment of Dr. Wilbur L. Smith as professor of mathematics. Smith holds the B.S. degree from A&T and two advanced degrees from the Pennsylvania State University.

To do this he said, "you will need to be prepared psychologically and philosophically to seek alternative routes to personal fulfillment and excellence."

The three C's of college he said are choice, community, and change. The choice was to come to college in the first place, when other things could have been selected instead. Community he said involves the sifting, seeking, exchanging, exploring, and examining truth.

"We give ourselves diligently to the study of books so that we may the sooner become free of them. College has an openness as a community. It is continuous with the larger community of business, the church, industry, politics, housing, poverty, and discrimination. This very openness makes every experience, on campus or off, a learning experience." Choice and community should bring about change in the individual, he continues. "Perhaps the educational enterprise still has the best chance of changing itself, and through this change, to bring about the kind of attitudinal and behavioral changes in people which will ultimately affect beneficial change in our other institutions."

Dr. Miller intimated that someone has said that in 20 years 50% of the jobs for which we prepare ourselves will have become obsolete. "You will not become obsolete if you create a demand for yourself by developing a combination of your talents, and your will that is genuine, dependable, unbeatable and incomparable."

He pointed out many new job opportunities now available because of such events as organ transplants, knowledge of RNA with its possibilities of genetic control, space exploration, and other job classifications that have resulted from these classifications.

## \$10,000 Gift Made To Saint Paul's College

LAWRENCEVILLE, Va. -- A \$10,000 unrestricted gift has been received by Saint Paul's College here from the Reynolds Metals Company of Richmond, Va., it was announced by President Earl H. McClenney of the college.

A check for that amount was presented by Paul Stuber, a Reynolds executive, to Saint Paul's trustees and administrators.

The gift was received by Saint Paul's as a member of a college group known as The Virginia Cluster. The other members are Virginia Union University, Richmond, and Virginia State College, Petersburg. The Virginia Cluster serves as an agency for faculty mem-
