# Ft. Monroe, Hampton In Partnership

HAMPTON, Va.-A new partnership between Hampton Insitute and nearby Fort Monroe has been announced which will allow military personnel to attend classes on post and receive resident credit toward an under graduate degree.

The plan will enable an acresident credits which he may transfer to another college or for which he may receive credit toward a degree from Hampton

The courses will be taught by Hampton Institute instructors, using the same texts and coursed content as are used in the regular daytime classes on campus.

The first three courses will be offered during the fall semester, beginning Setember 29 at the Ft. Monroe Education

Initial course offerings are in the field of business administration. The program of instruction will be expanded in February to include history and education courses.

According to Henry C. Stone, ducation Center director at Ft. Monroe, the Hampton Institute courses provide "one of the most attractive college programs for military personnel at any installation."

Under the Ft. Monroe-Hampton Institute program, Mr. Stone said, a soldier could complete his degree on post.
