The Reality Of A Long-Time Dream

SUNSET ACRES

APEX—As a prelude to opening wide the gates of our playground for the first time, I undertook the "trek" to Rocky Mount, at the invitation of Rev. George W. Dudley, to witness a huge Men's Day success at Mount Zion First Baptist Church.

The executive officer of Chapel Hill, a history-maker among Black people, in a clear lyric baritone authoritatively pitched voice, out-lined his prescription, "In action medicine," for the malaise that is snapping at the very vitals of our Country.
"I am grateful for my people's confidence plus the confidence of enough forward-looking, progressive White voters in our town to put into the office of Mayor the first Black man." University towns, with their activated intelligentsia, have a way of up-setting the marble-like notions of "solid citizens."
If we could come from a representative of service workers to the Chief's seat, what could we do in the State's Capital? We have St. Augustine, N. C. State University, Shaw University, Peace, Meredith and other good schools which produce enough thinkers to make Raleigh a boom town for togetherness.

The next Saturday, Oct. 11, I went to the Jack Tar in Durham to hear speakers and participate in seminars at the Annual Convention of the State National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. At the first seminar, chaired by an erudite, capable woman, who was speaking: "Racists say 'Negro wants separatism.' Don't believe them. There will be new schools but they will be integrated, not segregated."
In the District of Columbia and Kansas, a young woman had been denied entrance into a predominately white school; the Supreme Court has ruled that "freedom of choice does not insure sufficient desegregation; that money from U. S. Treasury to States for relief of poor is marked for clothing and adequate diet. If you

Jewish Labor Body Opposes Haynsworth

NEW YORK, N. Y. — The Jewish Labor Committee, an organization representing over 500,000 Jewish workers in the organized labor movement, re-stated its opposition to the appointment of Federal Judge Clement F. Haynsworth to the United States Supreme Court. In a letter to each individual Senator, Charles S. Zimmerman, President of the Jewish Labor Committee, last week called upon the Senate to vote against confirmation of Haynsworth's appointment.

Zimmerman declared that Judge Haynsworth has ruled in favor of perpetuating racial segregation in a number of cases dealing with public schools. He added, "Our Country's efforts to give black Americans and other minorities a feeling that they are first class citizens will be seriously impaired by this appointment. If the Senate confirms this appointment blacks and other Americans who espouse equal rights for all of our citizens may have good reason to question the Senate's credibility on this issue. Of course, we are disappointed with President Nixon's recommendation of Judge Haynsworth."

Zimmerman also stated that Haynsworth's record has been hostile toward organized labor to such an extent that the AFL-CIO opposes his confirmation.
