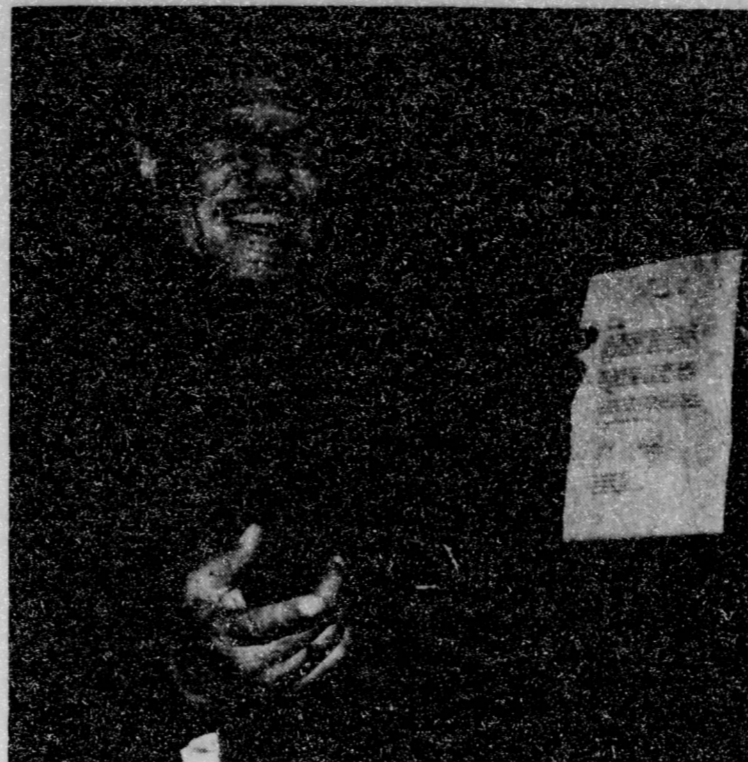
WIFE ACCUSES MATE

Labor Union Here Nixes Sales Tax

The Raleigh Central Labor Union voted unanimously Monday night to oppose the one-cent sales tax increase to be voted on Nov. 4.

W. H. Weatherman, president of the organization said, "The proposed 33 1/3 per cent increase in this unfair tax hits hardest at those in the low income group and retired persons who live on fixed incomes."

"The Wake County Commissioners have promised to commit the county's share of this money to the schools in an effort to get the voters to support the increase," Weatherman said, "but the bill passed by the General Assembly prohibits earmarking of the sales tax collections to a single function of government. They don't say how they will get around

that and certainly, and decision they make will not be binding on their successors."

"As the News and Observer said in a recent editorial, the one-cent sales tax is not for schools; it is for easing the property tax burden of large land owners and corporate citizens."

Ownership of property carries responsibilities as well as rights and it certainly should not carry special privileges for the richest to avoid fair taxation, Weatherman said.

"We urge our people, and all fair-minded citizens, to go to the polls Nov. 4 and vote against this increase," he said.

Names Nixon To Financial Aid Post

FAYETTEVILLE-Harold L. Nixon has been named Director of Financial Aid at Fayetteville State University, President Charles "A" Lyons announced recently.

Nixon comes to the newly created post from Washington, D. C. where he was formerly associated with the National Institute of Health.

Nixon will coordinate the University's Financial Aid program which includes work study, educational opportunity grants, government and state loans, special scholarship funds, insured loan programs and vocational rehabilitation.

More than 400 Fayetteville State students receive some type of financial assistance through this office.
