The linguistic authority, Leonard Bloomfield, once wrote:

"The only danger that threatens the native speaker of a standard language is artificiality: if he is snobbish, priggish, or timid, he may fill his speech (at least when he is on good behavior) with spelling-pronunciation and grotesque 'correct' forms. . .Variants such as 'it's I: it's me' have been used for centuries in the upper levels of English speech; there is no reason why anyone should make himself uncomfortable about them."
